ATTENTION PROGRAM DIRECTORS

All programs in the Bayh College of Education are encouraged to make social media accounts to help your program gain the attention that it deserves!

A few institutional guidelines:

- University Communication will be the first to announce all university news. Social media administrators can then share the information from the University. Communication's social media platforms. Do not tag media outlets (WTHI, WTWO, Tribune Star) in your post.

- An account needs at least two administrators. One of the administrators must be a university staff or faculty member.

MOU BETWEEN INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY AND DAEGU NATIONAL UNIVERSITY OF EDUCATION

During the period of Dec. 4-8, 2023, we had three visitors from Daegu National University of Education (DNUE), South Korea. The visitors are Dr. Phan Woo Park, the University President, Dr. Duk Soo Kim, the director of International Affairs Office, and Mr. Ilyong Bae, the staff manager of International Affairs Office. The university is the most prestigious teacher education program focusing on Elementary Education in Daegu, the 3rd largest city in South Korea.

As demand for exchange programs such as studying abroad in English-speaking countries increases among DNUE students, an exchange agreement (MOU) was signed with Indiana State University (USA) to implement various programs such as student teaching practice, language training and collaborative degree programs, and cultural exchange. From the picture, Dr. Phan Woo Park signed the new M.O.U. with Dr. Christopher Olsen at Indiana State University. The visitors inspected educational practice facilities for DNUE students in Terre Haute, IN.

Since 2018, Bayh College of Education at ISU has created the international partnerships with various universities in Far East Asian countries such as South Korea and Japan. DNUE became the 9th partnering institution to ISU on December 5th, 2023. The current partnering institutions in South Korea and Japan are as following:

Since 2018, ISU faculty members have been invited by the partnering institutions as special speakers or presenters by the various formats such as in-person or Zoom meetings. Dr. Yong Joon Park and several partnering institutions designed and produced the short-term Global Teacher Education Programs. So far, many students from six partnering institutions in South Korea and Japan participated in the Global Teacher Education Programs at ISU. As a short-term/course-based study abroad program in South Korea, Dr. Yong Joon Park is planning to visit several partnering institutions with ISU students in May 2025.

THE INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY ALPHA DELTA KAPPA COLLEGIATE CLUB AND THE INDIANA STUDENT EDUCATION ASSOCIATION

The Indiana State University Alpha Delta Kappa Collegiate Club and the Indiana Student Education Association have collaborated throughout the semester and both have experienced an exciting and rewarding fall semester! In September, we hosted an Open House Call Out Meeting for incoming freshmen and transfer students and garnered eight highly energetic new members! The groups combined resources to host an Ice Cream Social tabling event to promote their organizations early in the fall semester. In October members hosted an information meeting and a professional development session where they learned how to create their own personalized Sticky Notes. They also acquired several hundred new children's books, pencils, and TONS of candy for a Trunk-or-Treat event and distributed treats to over 2,000 children and their families! Also in October, five members attended a weekend professional conference in Indianapolis with Dr. Nail. Local teachers from the Alpha Delta Kappa Chi chapter surprised members with gift boxes and we celebrated one of our members, Kaitlyn David, being selected to receive the Indiana Nellie Remington Scholarship. In November we are hosting a service learning event to make sensory books for First Steps Indiana, an organization that supports families with preschool children who have blindness, low vision, and sight impairments. In December we will initiate new members and assist the Indiana Chi chapter with a Snack Time with Santa fundraiser event for a local community center. Great things are happening with ADKCC at ISU!

C.H.I.L.L.'s October Monthly Meeting offered a time for members to connect with each other and acquire new knowledge that will help them on campus and in their future careers. The meeting began with an activity that, through some controlled chaos, gave attendees the opportunity to get to know each other and learn to work together. The highlight of the meeting was a guest speaker from the Counseling Center that delivered a detailed presentation on the services provided by Indiana State. Members were equipped with the knowledge to seek the proper help if they find themselves in a situation that warrants it. Lastly, members of the Board of Directors spoke about recognizing and addressing poverty in the classroom. The goal of this presentation was to prepare pre-service teachers to tackle poverty in the classroom and provide the best opportunities possible for their future students. The meeting concluded with a time devoted to replenishing our Positivity Rock Garden that is located in the atrium of University Hall and a Halloween Costume Contest.

C.H.I.L.L. has maintained a steady stream of initiatives as the semester has progressed. We are currently working on a variety of donation drives. We are collecting food supplies for Sarah Scott Middle School, hygiene kits for area schools, teacher supplies, and more. We are also specifically building kits of necessary materials for homeless shelters, as well as forming food packages to provide a Thanksgiving dinner to impoverished families. Lastly, we are hard at work preparing for our annual Adopt-a-Family of Holidays at the Homestead event. These initiatives provide gifts and a community event for families in the area who may not have the opportunity to attend other admission based community events. As a backdrop to this work, we are preparing to submit our proposals to present at the National Association of School University Partnerships Conference this spring in Anaheim, California!

Colleagues Helping Implement Life-Long Learning had our November monthly meeting on November 17th, 2023, during which we opened with a Peanuts comic themed icebreaker so that the members could all work together to win and get to know each other better! Afterward, we dove into our professional development topic, "How to reengage a bored student." This involved breaking down the data of the attention span of a modern student and how we as future educators can combat this rising issue. Ideas were discussed of how to use a variety of tools for the classroom and online, some of which included games and activities to physically motivate the students. The online aspect is to help the student stay engaged by using tools they are familiar with and enjoy using. During our snack time we worked together to build 5 Thanksgiving baskets that were donated to Sarah Scott Middle School. The families receiving our donation were so grateful since they had reached out to Vigo County administration asking for food donations! Our December meeting is a service meeting to organize all our initiatives for delivery during study week. Initiatives include adopting 5 families from Ben Franklin Elementary so they will have a Christmas, 50 Hygiene Kits for Woodrow Wilson Middle School, Christmas at Clay City our holiday event for all elementary schools in Clay County, and motivational mugs for administrative assistants and custodians in our building.C.H.I.L.L. is also teaming with UNICEF to support teens in Gaza in an event in the Commons during study week.

We are excited to welcome Erin Merryn, author, activist, speaker, wife, mother, and the Force behind Erin's Law, as the keynote speaker.

In 2008 she began writing legislators to require personal body safety be taught to kids in school. This decision has brought her on a crusade across America to pass what is known as Erin's Law. Erin's Law is the first US child sexual abuse prevention education law requiring children be educated in schools. Erin has been traveling state to state testifying to lawmakers to pass Erin's law for 7 years. It is currently passed in 37 states as of January 2021. In December 2015 President Obama signed the federal version of Erin's Law providing federal funding for schools to use. It was the first federal bill passed funding sexual abuse prevention education.


