I am pleased to announce that our growing enrollment and budget management will allow us to once again provide pay increases to faculty and staff. Regular benefits-eligible employees hired on or before June 30 will be eligible for the salary increase as long as they completed and achieved a minimum of good performance on their performance evaluation. The increases will include a 1.25% standard increase for all eligible employees along with increases to the minimum of the pay grade, if applicable. In addition, there will be a limited pool of money for recent promotions, internal equity, or target salary increases. Increases for coaches, grant-funded positions, one-year and temporary employees will be determined within each vice presidential area based upon performance and available funding. - Flu shots are covered at 100 percent under the University's Anthem Medical plan. Employees can obtain a flu shot at the University Student Health Center or from their local doctor or pharmacy. The pharmacy won't bill Anthem so employees will need to pay the fee and then file for reimbursement with Anthem.
- Indiana State has been recognized by the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education for our water conservation efforts. The ranking recognizes efforts to conserve water usage and implement effective rainwater management practices including the recycling and reuse of rainwater. - Also on the sustainability front, the renovation of **Mills Hall** has earned a LEED Silver Certification, a national certification that recognizes the construction of energy and resource-efficient buildings.
- Cunningham Memorial Library is sponsoring a showing of the environmental documentary, *An Inconvenient Sequel: Truth to Power* that includes a live-streamed conversation with Al Gore. The

- Assistant Professor Mark McInerney and his students in ISU's Applied Health Sciences Department have partnered with the Purdue Extension Office to process fresh tomatoes from the Master Gardeners Giving Garden into spaghetti sauce so that community food pantries can use the sauce over the winter months. The students processed more than 1,400 pounds of tomatoes in the first batch. This is a great community service project that will benefit many.
- Congratulations to two-time ISU graduate **Chris Himsel** who was recently named Indiana Superintendent of the Year by the Indiana Association of Public School Superintendents. Four additional Indiana State alumni, **Scott Hanback, John Hunter, Tracy Lorey** and **Rob Moorhead**, were named District Superintendents of the Year. Chris earned his bachelor's and educational specialists degrees from ISU and is currently completing his Ph.D. with Indiana State. His nomination noted his efforts to turn around the school corporation's financial situation and implement a one-to-one computing project to give all students in grades 6 through 12 access to a laptop computer.
- The University Speakers Series will feature social media and business expert Erik Qualman at 7 p.m. October 12 in Tilson Auditorium in Tirey Hall. He is the author of the best-selling book, "Socialnomics," which spawned the movement of the same name. He will discuss how social media can be used as a digital tool and influencer for businesses around the world. Speakers Series events are free and open to the public.
