The list of those that impacted our lives and the progress that the University has made is long. While we were not able to honor everyone with a Jones Medal, we do want to thank everyone for your support of us, the university's mission, and the students of Indiana State University.

On Sunday night, we had a farewell pizza and selfie party with the students. This was a fun way to kick off finals week and have a chance to wish our students well. Cheri and I were gifted with a wonderful quilt made out of t-shirts from about 40 student organizations at ISU. What a great way to remember many of the organizations and the students who lead them.

This Friday, we will be cutting the ribbon on the new addition to the Health and Human Services Building. I hope you will attend the 1 p.m. ceremony in the North Gym addition to get a sneak peek at Phase I of this \$64 million state-funded project. The building will be ready for occupancy later this spring, and shortly thereafter, work will begin on Phase 2 – the renovation of the classrooms and labs in the existing building. It should be completed in the spring of 2019. Although construction is still being completed, tours will be offered following the brief ceremony.

At Saturday's Commencement, Indiana State will award two honorary degrees. Local artist **Bill Wolfe** will receive an honorary master of fine arts and former **Senator Luke Kenley** will receive an honorary doctor of humane letters.

Bill is an Indiana sculptor and painter whose studio is located in West Terre Haute. Locally, he is known for his 17-foot-tall statue of basketball legend Larry Bird, the V12 Sailor statue at ISU, the murals in the Vigo County Courthouse, the sculpture of the late Terre Haute poet Max Ehrmann and the restoration of the Gilbert Wilson murals in University Hall. Cheri and I were honored that he painted our official ISU portrait and were thrilled with the finished product.

The Honorable Luke Kenley retired from the Indiana General Assembly in September ending a quarter-century of distinguished service as a state senator. The Noblesville Republican was first elected to the State Senate in 1992 and has directly influenced major public policy issues relating to transportation and infrastructure, economic development, and K-12 education issues. He has been instrumental to higher education in the State of Indiana with his leadership of the Senate Appropriations Committee and his authoring of budget bills that support universities across the state as well as key statewide initiatives such as the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Scholars Program. He has also supported numerous projects at Indiana including the College of Health and Human Services and Hulman Center, the Indiana Principal Leadership Institute and Indiana State's student success initiatives.
