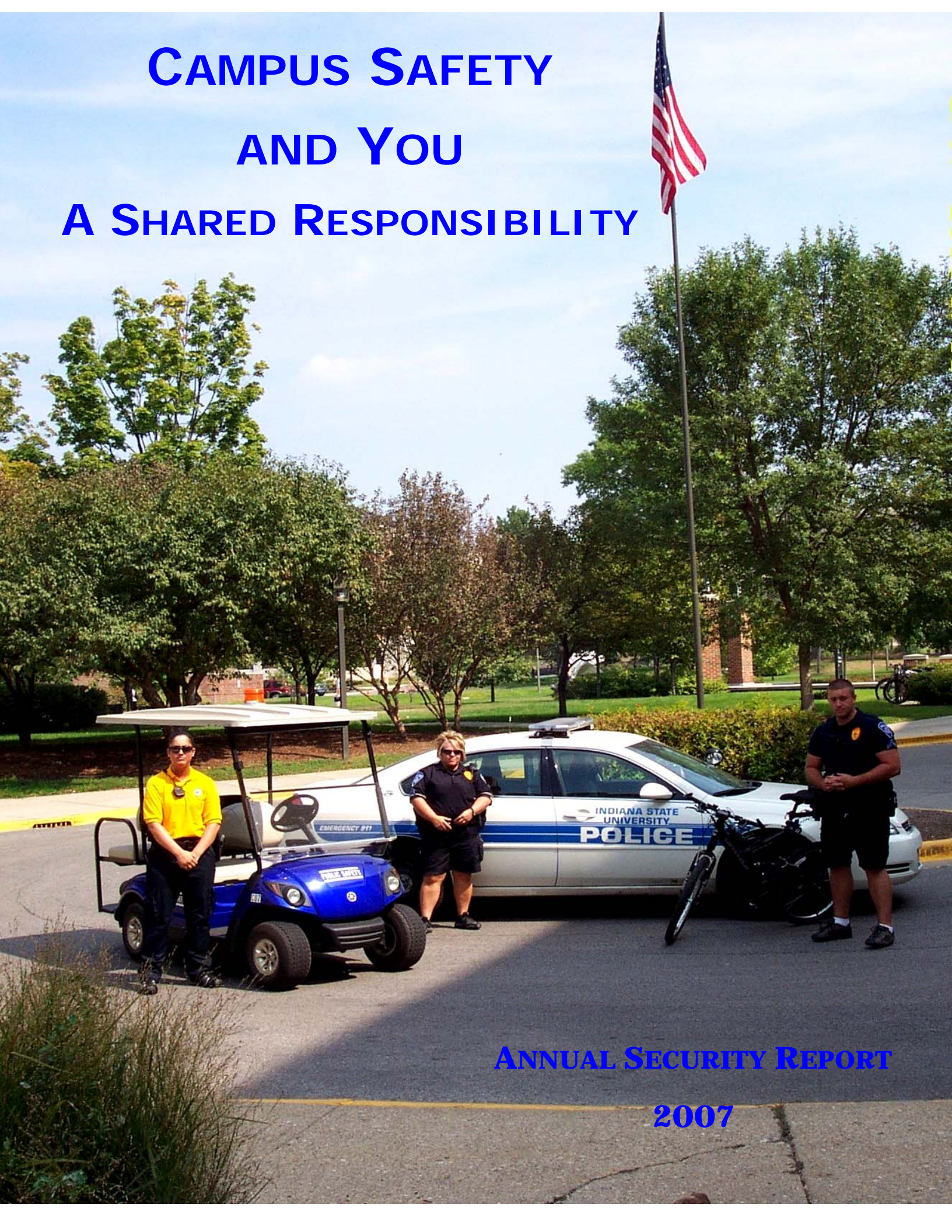

Crime Alerts

The Department of Public Safety shall make timely warnings under the heading “Crime Alert” whenever any of the following offenses have been reported on campus, on public property adjacent to campus, or off campus properties owned or controlled by the University and when it has been determined by the Chief of Police or his/her designee that the offense presents a threat to the University community. Offenses are murder, manslaughter, sex offense, robbery, aggravated assaults, burglary, motor vehicle theft, arson, and hate crimes. The purpose of these alerts is to provide information in a timely manner that will aid in the prevention of similar occurrences.

Crime Alerts are circulated via the global e-mail and Indiana State University portal systems, the Public Safety Web site, Statesman, local media, and posting of crime alerts in visible campus locations as may be deemed appropriate.

Enforcement, Jurisdiction, and Responsibilities

Indiana State University Public Safety maintains a 24-hour police operation located at 210 N. 6th Street between Erickson and Pickerl Halls. Police officers employed by the Public Safety Department exercise full police authority, including powers of arrest, on any property owned, leased, or used by Indiana State University. In addition, through a special agreement with the Vigo County Sheriff, officers exercise authority throughout Vigo County and Indiana. All officers are graduates of the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy. When an Indiana State University student is involved in an off-campus offense, ISU Police officers may assist with the investigation in cooperation with local, state, or federal law enforcement. Specifically, it is the responsibility of the department to provide personal and facility security, campus law enforcement, crime prevention and awareness programs, investigative services, public safety communications systems, disaster preparedness planning, emergency medical assistance, and parking and traffic control.

To report a crime

Members of the University community are strongly encouraged to report all crimes and suspicious activity to the Public Safety Department or appropriate law enforcement agency in a prompt and timely manner. Indiana State University has several resources available for reporting crime or other emergencies occurring on campus. Students, faculty, staff, and guests should use the following resources when appropriate.

Emergency Reporting

Dial 911 from any campus telephone or use the “Help” button on the Code Blue phone system to reach Public Safety. If using a cell phone on campus, dial (812) 237-5555 for an emergency.

Crime Log

A crime log is published Monday through Friday and is available for viewing at the Public Safety department. The log includes the nature, date, time, general location, and disposition of each crime. All log entries, except where disclosure of such information is prohibited by law or such disclosure would jeopardize the confidentiality of the victim, will be open to public inspection within two business days of the initial report being made to the department or to a campus security authority. Any new information obtained is added to the log no later than two business days after the information becomes available, unless there is clear and convincing evidence that the release of such information would: 1) jeopardize an ongoing criminal investigation or the safety of an individual; 2) cause a suspect to flee or to evade detection; 3) result in the destruction of evidence.

In the past year, five new officers have started at ISUPD, two experienced officers and three officers that are attending the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy in Plainfield.



Officer Brian Pierce started his law enforcement career as a deputy with the Clay County Sheriff Department, Brazil Indiana. He worked as deputy sheriff for 14 years leaving there to work for ISU PD in March of 2007. Currently assigned as a patrol officer and returning to classes here at ISU.



Officer Joshua O'Brien first started with Public Safety his senior year of high school as an intern. His freshman year of college at ISU, he became a CSO, eventually becoming the CSO supervisor. In April of 2007 he was hired as an Officer and is now attending the IN Law Enforcement Academy with anticipated graduation in October, 2007. He is continuing his education at ISU to obtain his degree in Criminology.



Officer Christopher Gresham is originally from Terre Haute. He has a B.S. in criminology from ISU and is currently working on his M.S. in Student Affairs at ISU. He worked in the U.S. Air Force as a Security Police Member from 2001 to 2007. He was a police officer in West Terre Haute for 1 year, an officer in Paris, Il for almost 2 years. He was the DARE officer for Paris. He is married with two children and lives in Terre Haute, IN.



Officer Matthew Murray is currently in his senior year of a Criminology degree here at ISU and is anticipating graduation in 2008. He will be attending the academy in February, 2008 and has wanted to be a police officer for as long as he can remember. In his spare time he likes to play soccer and stay active.



Officer Marcia Bahr graduated from ISU spring 2004 with a major in Psychology and a minor in Criminology. She was employed at Hamilton Center for 2 ½ years as an addiction counselor before beginning her law enforcement career at ISU and she is currently attending the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy and anticipating graduation in October, 2007.

Campus Safety *Helpful Hints*

- ⇒ Use the SafEscort service.
- ⇒ Walk with another person whenever possible.
- ⇒ Park in well-lit and well-traveled areas.
- ⇒ Only travel on well-lit streets.
- ⇒ Avoid narrow walkways between buildings.
- ⇒ Be wary of strangers who stop and ask for directions.
- ⇒ Do not accept rides from strangers and never hitchhike.
- ⇒ Park vehicles in University parking lots.
- ⇒ Keep all articles out of sight in vehicles.
- ⇒ Lock your vehicle and make sure all your windows are closed.
- ⇒ Use ATM's located inside University buildings.
- ⇒ Lock you door whenever you leave your residence hall room or University office.
- ⇒ Do not keep a large amount of cash in your residence room or University office.
- ⇒ Do not loan your key to anyone.
- ⇒ Immediately report lost or stolen keys.

COMMUNITY SERVICE OFFICER PROGRAM (CSO)

The Department of Public Safety has taken one of the University's initiative to task. "Experiential Learning!"

The Community Service Officer Program (CSO Program) started over ten years with a handful of students. Former Captain Russell Floyd introduced the program to help the campus community, police officers, and give students the chance to experience a small role in law enforcement.

The students chosen to be Community Service Officers with the ISU Police Department are selected with the hopes that a learning process can occur that will educate and prepare the student for a career of service within a criminal justice agency.

The goals of the CSO program are to provide students the opportunity to develop communications, teamwork, customer, and community service skills in a law enforcement setting. The program will allow training opportunities that will improve student's practical knowledge of the law enforcement field and enhance their marketability to prospective employers.

The students attend a mini Academy for training before starting their positions. The training sessions cover many of duties of the CSO: Parking enforcement, Special Events, Radio Use, Safety Escorts, Battery Jumps, Lock Outs, and Motorist assistance.



BATTERY JUMPS/VEHICLE LOCKOUTS

The Public Safety department offers a vehicle lock-out service and battery jumps for motorists on campus. There is no charge for these services but individuals requesting these services must sign a release form. To request one of these services, call (812) 237-5555.



PARKING ENFORCEMENT

Includes writing tickets, monitoring parking lots, and towing if necessary.



SAFESCORT

A service in which members of the Indiana State University community may receive a safety escort (24 hours a day) by a Public Safety employee. To request this service, call (812) 237-5555.

COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION



Call 911 for emergency only!

When reporting a crime provide the communications officer with as much information as possible, such as:

- the geographical location of the incident
- a description of the individuals involved, hair color, height, clothing description
- description of vehicles involved, color, make, damage if any

It is the mission of the Public Safety Department Communications division to serve as a link between the University community (including visitors and guests) and Indiana State University for matters relating to public safety and emergency assistance. The Communications Center is staffed 24 hours a day seven days a week by certified Law Enforcement Communications Officers, trained by the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy and Vigo County 911 Office.

Communications Officers are responsible for answering calls for police, fire, emergency medical services, maintenance and escort services. They monitor fire, intrusion, emergency and maintenance alarms and dispatch the appropriate people needed to correct those situations when they occur.

The blue light phone system provides a direct link to the Public Safety Department and to 911 services. The Communications Center serves as the primary monitoring station for that system. Along with the telephone system, video cameras have been installed to increase security in the parking lots.

The Communications Center is equipped with and constantly updating to the latest technology in order to efficiently serve the University community.

TRAFFIC AND PARKING SERVICES



Traffic and Parking Services is a division of the Public Safety Department. The division's main objective is to enforce the Motor Vehicle Rules and Regulations, and is therefore responsible for establishing parking policies, parking enforcement, issuing parking permits, parking lot and street closings, and parade and special events. Community Service Officers enforce the rules and regulations for 24 parking lots (see campus map in back). Parking permits are available on-line or at our office which is located at 210 North 6th Street. Faculty/administrative staff permits are \$100/year and staff/student permits are \$85.00/year.

Traffic and Parking Services also issues the Sycamore ID cards. All members of the Indiana State University community (faculty, staff, and students) are required to have a valid ID card. These cards are used for meal plan credits, library book/material checkout, computer center use, recreational sports use, the theater, and sporting events. The first ID card is printed free of charge. Any additional cards or replacements are \$15.00 each.

ADVANCE STUDENT PERMIT SALES DECREASES WAIT TIME

Traffic and Parking Services now offers an alternative to waiting in long lines for your parking permit.

In past years, our office would sell 500 – 600 permits each day during the first week of classes. With the size of our office and only three cashier stations available, this made the wait time for our customers between 45 – 90 minutes and sometimes longer!

Beginning with the 2007 Fall Semester, students were able to download parking forms off the web to purchase their parking permit. The process is as easy as **1-2-3!**

- 1. Visit the Traffic and Parking Services website at http://www.indstate.edu/pubsafety/traffic_parking.htm and print out the form.**
- 2. Fill out the form and mail it with your payment and a copy of your vehicle registration to Traffic & Parking Services.**
- 3. Pick up your permit in August when you return to campus.**

Students who took advantage of the new advance permit sales program saw a wait time of only a few minutes! The first year of the program was a huge success and we hope to add more benefits to the program in the future.

PATROL DIVISION

Indiana State University maintains a 24-hour Public Safety operation located at 210 N. 6th Street between Erickson and Pickerl Hall. The Public Safety Department has 24 full-time police officers. Police Officers employed by the Public Safety Department exercise full police authority and enforce federal and state laws, as well as University policies.

Officers also have arrest powers, on any property owned, leased, or used by Indiana State University. In addition, through a special agreement with the Vigo County Sheriff, officers exercise authority throughout Vigo County. The Public Safety Department maintains a strong working relationship with other university police agencies and local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies.

Responsibilities

- Enforcement of federal, state, and local laws
- Enforcement of University policies
- Criminal investigations
- Personal and facility security
- Vehicle crash investigations
- Emergency medical assistance
- Public safety communications systems
- Emergency Disaster preparedness planning
- Traffic regulation and control
- Vehicle, bike and foot patrol of University property
- Crime prevention and awareness programs



BIKE PATROL

Indiana State University Police Department now has nine Police Bike Officers that are trained and certified by International Police Mountain Bike Association. Lt. David Smith, also a bike officer with ISU is an instructor with IMPBA and has trained numerous officers throughout the United States. The Bike patrol is made possible by a grant from the Local Coordinating Council.

The Police Bike Officers are a great enforcement tool on a college campus, and helps maintain positive contact with the public. The Police Bike Officers are also involved in our community with bicycle rodeos, rides, and presentations for all ages.

In 2007 we added three new Police Bike Officers to the unit, Cpl. Ian Loomis, Officer Heather Cummings and Officer Mark Crown.



CRIME PREVENTION SERVICES and PROGRAMS



NEW CRIME PREVENTION OFFICER

Officer Meredith Ditz has been a staff member with the university since her graduation in 2000. She holds a B.S. in Communications with a minor in Women's Studies from ISU. She has been an officer with ISUPD for two years and has recently accepted the Crime Prevention Officer position.

ADOPT-A-HALL

The Adopt-A-Hall program was initiated at ISU during the fall semester of 2001. Participating officers and communications officers select residence halls and work closely with Residential Life staff within the selected residence halls. The educational and crime prevention needs of each residence hall are assessed and programming is specifically designed and implemented to address these needs. On a weekly basis, participating officers patrol their respective residence halls and spend time with the staff and residents of these halls; as a result, residents are more likely to approach participating officers to report concerns, crimes, and issues. The crime prevention officer is available to provide programming in residence halls that do not have an Adopt-A-Hall assignment. RAD

A 12 hour certification self defense course for women.

CPTED

A service in which a selected area or building is surveyed and evaluated for security risks. Recommendations and suggestions are made for the improvement of the assessed area. More information is available by calling (812) 237-8285.



BICYCLE REGISTRATION

A service in which members of the Indiana State University community can document important bicycle information regarding their bicycles with the Public Safety Department. More information is available by calling (812) 237-8285.



SAFETY IN THE RESIDENCE HALLS

Alcohol and Drug Policies and Educational Programs

Indiana State University policy prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of controlled substances or alcohol in any part of the University or at any University activity. Legal use of alcohol may be permitted on campus **only if approved by the University president or his/her designee**. All state and federal laws regarding alcohol and drugs are strictly enforced. Indiana State University complies with all provisions of the *Federal Drug-Free Work Place Act* requirements. Additional information is located in the *University Standards* publication or by contacting David Wright, assistant to the Vice-President of Student Affairs, (812) 237-3888. The University offers a number of educational programs and resources regarding alcohol and drugs. These programs include presentations, information, and literature promoting responsible decision-making concerning the use of alcohol and drugs and are available on a continuing basis through the Public Safety department, as well as the following departments: Student Health Promotion, Residential Life, and Employee Assistance Program.

Campus Facilities: Access, Security, and Maintenance

Access to campus buildings and grounds is a privilege extended to students, faculty, staff, and guests. The University encourages an open environment with limitations to assure adequate protection of all members of the University community. Except for residence halls, most campus facilities are normally open when classes are in session or by special arrangements with the building coordinator. A few University facilities are available to the general community. Building hours are monitored and buildings are secured at the end of the regular academic day.

During non-operational hours, University buildings are locked. Only faculty, staff, and students with proper authorization and identification are permitted into buildings.

The Facilities Management department provides maintenance of campus buildings and grounds, continually upgrades security systems, and incorporates modern security techniques when remodeling and designing new facilities.

Unsafe facility conditions or those that raise concerns for personal safety and property protection, including inoperative locking hardware, exterior lighting, steps, handrails, unsecured equipment, and hazardous conditions, should be reported by calling (812) 237-8100. During non-operational hours, report safety hazards to the Public Safety department at (812) 237-5555.

Residential Life continually evaluates security procedures for the residence halls and implements many preventive measures. Outside doors are locked at 12:00 p.m. key floor stairwell access and key floor elevators are open 24/7. For additional information about residence hall security, contact Residential Life (812) 237-3993.

Comprehensive Approach

Safety is a community issue. All members of the University community must take an active role in their safety and the safety of others. Sexual Assault

Policy

Indiana State University is committed to maintaining an environment free from all exploitation and intimidation based on sex. The University will not tolerate sexual assault or sexual harassment in any form. Indiana State University pursues a variety of initiatives designed to combat incidents of rape, sexual assault, or other forms of non-consensual sexual activity. Non-consensual sexual activity shall include, but not be limited to, situations in which the victim is unable to consent because he or she is physically helpless, mentally incapacitated due to drug or alcohol consumption, or unconscious, regardless of whether the consumption was with the victim's consent.

If You or a Friend Are the Victim of a Sexual Assault

1. Get to a safe place and contact the Public Safety Department immediately at 911 from an on-campus phone or (812) 237-5555 from a cell phone. If the assault occurred off-campus, call 911 immediately or contact the following appropriate law enforcement agency:

- ⇒ Indiana State Police (812) 299-1151
- ⇒ Terre Haute Police Department (812) 238-1661
- ⇒ Vigo County Sheriff's Department (812) 462-3226

Upon reporting the incident, the Public Safety Department or appropriate law enforcement agency can assist the victim in attaining medical and counseling services. Although reporting to the appropriate law enforcement agency is recommended, victims may also confidentially report sexual assaults to the Student Counseling Center (812) 237-3939 or seek assistance from other members of the University community.

2. Preserve physical evidence, such as clothing, sheets, and alcoholic beverages (for date rape drug testing). Do not bathe or shower.
3. Seek medical attention. For evidence collection purposes and for emergency contraception seek medical attention within 72 hours of the assault. During normal hours of operation, the Student Health Center, (812) 237-3883, provides medical assistance, emergency contraception, HIV testing, treatment for STDs, and can perform sexual assault evidence collection for prosecution purposes. The Student Health Center can also assist victims in applying for victim's compensation to cover the costs of treatment and counseling. These services are also available by going to an emergency room of a local hospital or to your local physician. Terre Haute area hospitals are:

5. Victims of alleged sexual assault may seek to have their academic and living situations changed if such changes are reasonably available. Class schedule changes may be requested by contacting Student Affairs, Parsons Hall room 203 or (812) 237-3888. Living arrangement changes may be requested by contacting Residential Life, Mills Hall lower level or (812) 237-3993

Whatever avenue the victim decides to follow for filing a complaint, it is important to follow these steps in order to ensure the possibility of criminal prosecution and/or University student judicial finding.

On Campus Disciplinary Proceedings

Student Judicial Programs handles all on campus disciplinary proceedings for sexual assault complaints. Both the complainant and the accused student in any non-consensual sexual activity case are entitled to the following rights:

- To be assisted by a procedural advisor during a disciplinary hearing and
- To be informed of the outcome of any disciplinary proceeding conducted within the Student Judicial System

Sanctions for violations of University policies regarding sexual assault may include:

- Relocation or loss of campus housing privileges
- Reassignment of academic courses to avoid contact with the complainant and
- Status sanction, including disciplinary probation, suspension, or expulsion

Sex Offender Directory

Indiana State law requires that all convicted sex offenders register with the county Sheriff in their county of residence. Indiana State University Public Safety department maintains a link to the Indiana State Sex Offender Registry on the Public Safety web site. Sexual Harassment

Policy

Indiana State University is committed to creating and maintaining a positive learning and working environment for its students and employees and will not tolerate sexual harassment. ISU is committed to preventing sexual harassment and to promptly addressing any violations of this policy.

Sexual harassment is prohibited because it is demeaning and degrading and a form of prohibited discrimination on the basis of sex. It is an affront to an individual's dignity, sense of self, and self-esteem. As such it can have a negative impact on performance at work or in an academic setting. Sexually harassing behaviors are prohibited by the University and will not be tolerated.

Sexual harassment is illegal as a violation of several state and federal laws including Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. As a recipient of federal funds, ISU must comply with these federal statutes. Sexual harassment is also prohibited in the Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action Policy adopted by the ISU Board of Trustees, effected in 1981 and confirmed in 1993 and 2003.

This policy applies to all persons at the University or attending University sponsored classes, events, and programs. Visitors to the campus and workers employed by private firms engaged in business on the campus are expected to comply with this policy.

The Office of Diversity and Affirmative Action is charged with distributing this policy to the University community and providing educational opportunities appropriate to faculty, staff, and students.

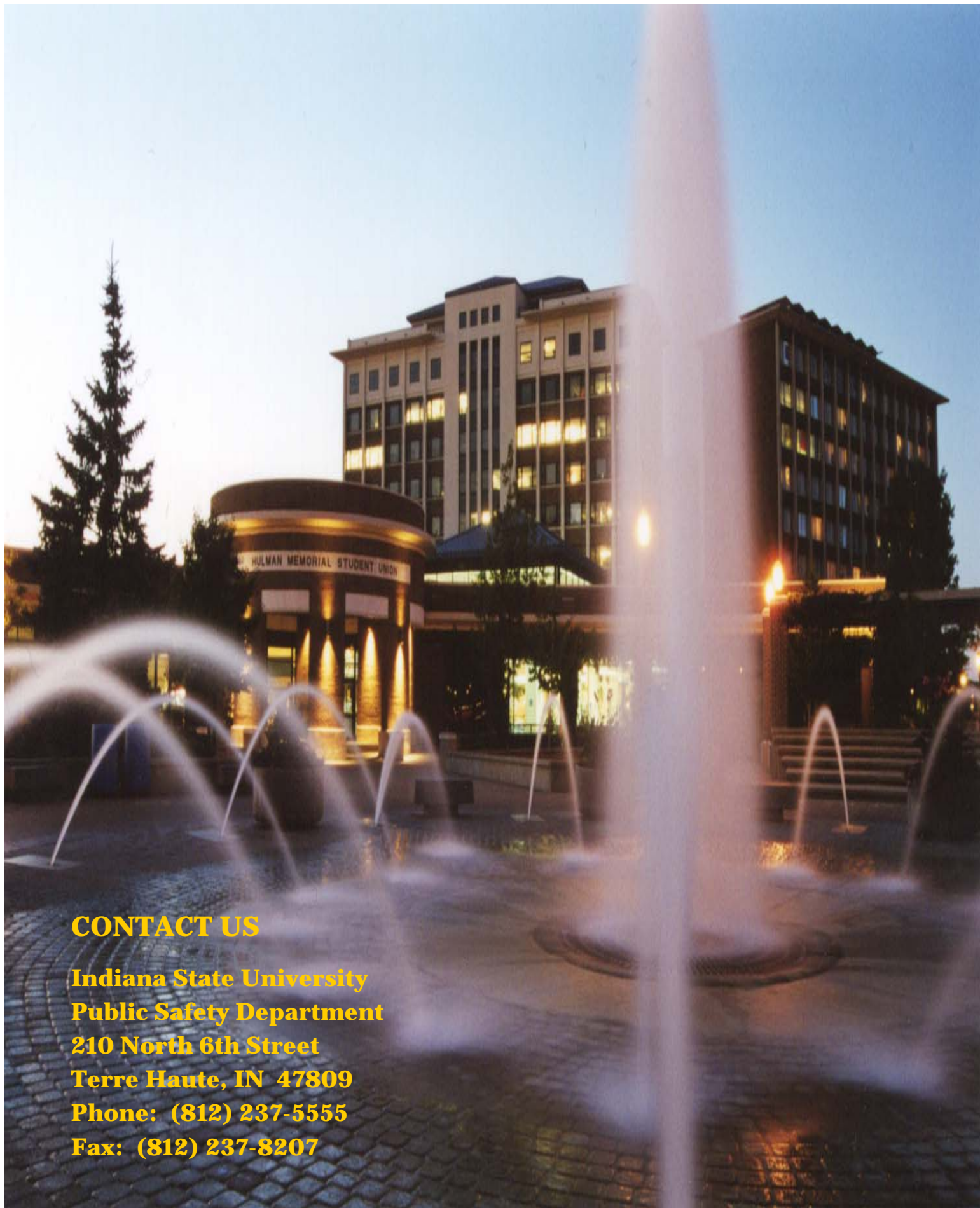
