High Tech Crime Unit

In 2020 Vigo County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Rob Roberts began talks with School of Criminology and Security Studies Instructor and Academic Advisor Travis Behem about creating a High Tech Crime Unit with the recently established Cybercriminology program. Chief Deputy Roberts had learned about a program that had been created in St. Joseph County (IN) with the University of Notre Dame, and wanted to create a similar program at Indiana State. Unfortunately, the pandemic took hold and derailed that project.

However, in early 2021 Indiana H.R. Bill 1082 was authored by Rep. Greg Steuerwald, R-Avon and presented to the legislature. The bill was created to fund and establish 10 High Tech Crim Units (HTCUs) throughout the state of Indiana, similar to that which had been created in St. Joseph County. In April of 2021 that bill was signed by Indiana Governor Holcomb. The bill established \$3 million in funding for the creation of HTCUs.

The next process was to select which programs become an HTCUs. Statewide there were 17 applications that were submitted by schools hoping to become an HTCUs. The Indiana Prosecuting Attorneys Council (IPAC) held meetings during which proposals were presented by those programs competing for this opportunity. In the fall, after a competitive five-month process, IPAC had made its selections. These ten HTCUs, once established, would be expected to cover all 92 counties in Indiana. Funding for each unit varies, but averages out to approximately \$300,000 per HTCUs. The host counties oversee the grant money that is used to fund the HTCUs labs, equipment, software, and payroll for internships. Vigo County was selected, and received a grant for \$285,000 to establish the HTCUs with Indiana State University.

The partnership between the prosecutor's office and the School of Criminology will allow evidence to be brought by law enforcement personnel to the secure HTCUs lab where it will be analyzed by interns. The interns are sworn in by the Vigo County Prosecutor's office and have law enforcement powers as investigators while in the lab and under supervision by sworn forensic experts. Interns will use a variety of digital tools to look for and recover evidence of crimes, which will then be reported and used for prosecution. This work provides invaluable real-world field experience for ISU students while saving local detectives countless investigative hours looking through vast amounts of digital data within computer hard drives and cell phones.

It is expected that using the HTCUs it will shorten the turnaround time for detectives and prosecutors who might otherwise have to wait much longer for digital evidence to be processed. Students will gain hands-on professional experience that will likely be relevant for long term career opportunities. Students will utilize a variety of software programs and digital forensics tools, applying their skills and knowledge to actual criminal cases.

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“Digital evidence is an area that is constantly growing, including cell phone communications and location data, computer forensics and surveillance recordings. This evidence not only strengthens investigations, but is has also been used to exclude suspects during investigations,” Prosecutor Terry Modessitt said. “This program gives our student investigators training, certifications, and real life experience, while assisting law enforcement in accessing and preserving important evidence.” As quoted from the Tribune Star.

The Vigo County HTCU will offer service to 8 counties: Vigo, Clay, Fountain, Hendricks, Parke, Putnam, Sullivan, and Vermillion. These counties will be able to have their evidence processed by the ISU HTCU.

On February 21, 2022 the School of Criminology and Security Studies had a “grand opening” with representatives from several of the area agencies that are now being served attending the event, along with Rob Roberts and Terry Moddesit from the VCPO. The open house showcased the new lab, computers, and other tools the students will be utilizing to process evidence.

Students have been processing evidence on a variety of different cases, and their case load shows no signs of slowing down. There are now 7students who have been sworn in to work in the HTCU.

After 1 ½ Year Covid Delay, University of Zagreb Students Return to ISU

In late September and early October of 2021, ISU School of Criminology and Security Studies and the University of Zagreb Faculty of Education and Rehabilitation resumed their long-standing bilateral student exchange program after a sixteen-month Covid delay. The School of Criminology and Security Studies hosted 21 students and two faculty members from the University of Zagreb who were welcomed by ISU Provost Dr. Chris Olsen and Center for Global Engagement Director Dr. Chris McGrew at a luncheon reception and by ISU President Dr. Curtis at a meeting hosted by ISU Crim Lambda Alpha Epsilon members.

ISU School of Criminology and Security Studies faculty provided University of Zagreb students with academic opportunities to join with ISU Crim students in their regularly scheduled classes and to attend specially provide lectures. University of Zagreb students also visited Terre Haute community service providers including Gibault, Hamilton Center, and Vigo County Drug Court. Visiting students also were treated to time in the ISU Crim Cyber and Forensic labs. The students also tour the new Terre Haute Police Department building.

The program was coordinated by ISU Criminology Associate Professor Lisa Decker who facilitates the annual bilateral exchange program. This summer Decker will be taking eight ISU Criminology students to the University of Zagreb for a two-week intensive comparative criminology class on “Recidivism and Post-penal Treatment.” After their joint academic experience with University of Zagreb students, ISU students will continue with two weeks of post-class travel to Rome, Naples, and Bari, Italy as well as Dubrovnik and Split Croatia.

Dr. Avdi Avdija Promoted

Dr. Avdi Avdija was recently promoted to full professor status within the School of Criminology & Security Studies. Dr. Avdija received an A.S. in Criminal Justice at Minneapolis Community and Tech. College, his B.A. in Criminal Justice from Metropolitan State University, his M.S. in Criminal Justice from St. Cloud State University, and his Ph.D. in Criminology from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. Since 2010 Dr. Avdija has been teaching at the Indiana State University.



Dr. Avdija has published 37 research articles, including 2 books and 2 book chapters. Currently, he has three research articles under review: one on homicide studies and two research articles on college stress and its effect on students' psychological well-being. His current research in-progress includes research on developing spatial and temporal profiles of violent and non-violent crimes, examining personality disorders and their effect on serial killers' motivational typology, gender differences in the behavioral profiles of serial killers, and the accuracy of eyewitness identification. Other research interests include school security and violence, psychometric theory, and crime and victimization, among others.

Dr. Avdija's advice to students entering the School of Criminology & Security Studies or considering a degree in Criminal Justice or Criminology is that this is a broad field, with many job opportunities. A degree in criminology and criminal justice can give students opportunities to consider a variety of career paths working in law enforcement, corrections, court systems, public offices, emergency management jobs, the private security industry, etc. Additionally, the field of criminal justice reaches out to many related fields such as social work, counseling, and juvenile institutions, to name just a few. Studying criminal justice gives students many tools they can use in their career, while also teaching them to consider other perspectives when dealing with social issues.

BRAZIL, IND. (Jan. 13, 2022) – Indiana sheriffs, business leaders, and labor leaders announced today that Vigo County Sheriff John Plasse will lead their non-profit Indiana Sheriffs' Youth Ranch as vice president in 2022.



“Sheriff Plasse was elected from among 92 sheriffs statewide to help ramp-up construction and operations at our 62-acre training retreat for future law enforcement officers, at-risk kids, young witnesses and victims of crime,” said former Marion County Sheriff John Layton, ISYR’s founder and re-elected president.

Layton and Plasse will serve as officers of the not-for-profit with Clark County Sheriff Jamey Noel, also a vice president; Grant County Sheriff Reggie Nevels, secretary; and Allen County Sheriff David Gladieux, treasurer.

“COVID-19 has delayed us somewhat on fundraising and building at the Youth Ranch,” Plasse said. “However, we are quickly regaining momentum with the help of deep support and widespread partnerships.”

Plasse said the completion of blueprints, installation of new sewer and water lines, and recent decreases in building-material prices now position them to begin work on long-awaited cabins, a peace chapel and recreational features.

“2022 is going to be a year of construction, expansion and transition,” Plasse said. “Now more than ever, law enforcement needs to be mentoring future deputies and officers, bonding with at-risk kids, and comforting young witnesses and victims of crime.”




Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences Conference
