Cheryl Sharp holds the unique perspective of a person who struggled with severe mental health challenges, a trauma survivor, a family member of a loved one who died as a result of mental health challenges, and a provider of substance abuse and mental health services. Sharp has worked with adult trauma survivors for over 30 years and trains and speaks internationally on trauma-informed care. She is an advanced level WRAP facilitator, Mental Health First Aid USA trainer/ instructor, and trainer of Intentional Peer Support. Sharp is also an ordained minister. She has worked as a hospice/medical social worker and as a director of social services for a skilled nursing facility. As the leader of the National Council's Trauma-Informed Care Learning Communities, Sharp has led over 500 organizations in the implementation of trauma-informed care. Ms. Sharp is also the project lead for the National Council's crisis services and suicide prevention efforts. She received the Lou Ann Townsend Courage Award for her contributions to persons with psychiatric disabilities.

Kelly Hutchins is a Clinical Psychologist and the Coordinator of Trauma-Informed Care at HCI. She has been leading HCI as well as other community organizations, providing direction, training, and guidance toward becoming a trauma-informed system of care. Dr. Hutchins is an outpatient psychologist completing psychological testing, individual, group, and family therapy with consumers throughout the lifespan. She holds a BA in Psychology and Law and Society from Purdue University, an MS EdS in Counseling Psychology from Florida State University, and a Psy.D in Clinical Psychology from University of Indianapolis. She received her postdoctoral training in Bakersfield, CA at the Kern County Mental Health Department. Her clientele includes children, adolescents, families, juvenile offenders, and incarcerated females. She also has expertise in psychological testing and evaluations (behavioral health, developmental conditions, forensic, competency, parenting, and child hearsay). Her special interests are primarily working with adolescents, young adults, and women and in studying and treating trauma across the lifespan, female incarceration, and feminist theory.

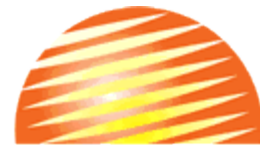
