Aging & Geriatric Care Management

Learning Objectives

Aging

1. Explain how the growing population of older adults will impact society, including considerations of economics, health care, living arrangements, and ethical and moral issues.
2. Describe the biological and psychosocial theories of aging and summarize major physiological changes that occur as a result of the normal aging process.

Session 3

Falls, Polypharmacy, and Dementia Evaluation

Learning Objectives

Falls:

1. Describe the effect of aging on gait.
2. Discuss the impact of hip fractures.
3. Discuss methods to evaluate for fall risk.
4. Review strategies to reduce fall risk.

Pharmacology:

1. Review pharmacological principles and their alteration in aging and the risks of polypharmacy.
2. Evaluate the common prescribing errors made in the elderly.
3. Identify common drug-drug and drug-disease interactions seen in the elderly.
4. Develop an approach for safe drug prescribing and monitoring in the elderly.

Dementia Evaluation:

1. Describe epidemiology and cost of Alzheimer's disease.
2. Review the early warning signs of Alzheimer's disease.
3. Discuss screening and evaluation of the patient with suspected dementia.
4. Evaluate potential preventive measures of cognitive impairment.
5. Analyze pharmacologic versus non-pharmacologic treatment options of dementia.

Steven McDonald MD graduated from Southern Illinois University in 1976 and completed residency training at Union Hospital's Family Medicine Residency. He was in private practice in Terre Haute, IN from 1979-2011; he then accepted the position of Program Director of the Residency in 2011. Dr. McDonald completed an Alzheimer fellowship at Washington University in St. Louis in 2003. He opened the Harold McDonald Alzheimer Care Center in 2004 with special emphasis on early diagnosis, caregiver support, and community awareness. His special interests in medicine include geriatrics, Alzheimer's disease, and chronic disease management.
