APRIL 26, 2002

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in regular session at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, April 26, 2002, in the State Room, Tirey Hall.

Trustees present: Mr. Alley, Mr. Bonds, Mr. Dooley, Mr. Fleetwood, Mrs. House, Mr. Huntsinger, and Dr. Zietlow. Trustees absent: Mr. Shagley and Mr. Smith.

President Benjamin, Vice Presidents Pontius, Quatroche, and Schafer and Interim Vice President Elsey were present. Also attending were Ms. Melony Sacopulos, General University Counsel, Dr. Jerome Cerny, Chairperson, University Faculty Senate, Ms. Wandell Gabey, Chairperson, Support Staff Council and Mr. Kier Hopkins-Smith, Vice President of the Student Government Association.

There being a quorum present, Mrs. House called the meeting to order at 9:05 a.m.

SECTION I

A. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES (Mrs. House)

On a motion by Mr. Huntsinger, seconded by Mr. Fleetwood, the minutes of the February 22, 2002 meeting were approved as presented.

B. DATE OF NEXT MEETING (Mrs. House)

The dates for the next meeting are June 6-7, 2002.
Spring Commencement will be held on Saturday, May 4, 2002.

C. REPORT OF THE BOARD PRESIDENT (Mrs. House)

President House commented on the ending of another academic year with commencement scheduled on May 4. She attended several events including the retirement tea, the President's Scholars Banquet and the Athletes Scholars Banquet. All the events were well attended and recognized individuals who had given long service to the University or had excelled in the classroom.

Yesterday seminars on institutional effectiveness and the 2002-03 budget were presented. She noted the Board realizes how much preparation and time goes into these presentations and thanked those involved for their efforts.

Election of officers is conducted at the July Annual meeting. Mrs. House appointed the Nominating Committee consisting of: Mr. Dooley, Chairperson, Dr. Zietlow and Mr. Huntsinger. The committee will meet in June and is to present a slate of officers at the July meeting.

D. REPORT OF THE UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT (Dr. Benjamin)

ACE Fellow

Dr. Benjamin introduced Dr. Darlene Hantzis, Associate Dean, College of Arts and Sciences and Associate Professor of Communication. Dr. Hantzis has been named a 2002-03 American Council on Education Fellow. The selection was based on her academic credentials and potential for administrative leadership as well as recommendations of professional colleagues and the judgment of interviewing teams made up of senior administrators. This is an outstanding opportunity for both Professor Hantzis and Indiana State University.

Association of American Colleges and Universities Summer Institute

For the second year in a row ISU has been invited to send a team to participate in the Association of American Colleges and Universities Summer Institute, July 23-28, 2002. ISU's team will focus its work on various structural issues associated with the University's emerging identity.

Team members will develop a model of quality student engagement in the community that ensures a firm grounding in liberal arts education, common proficiencies to be gained, and tangible outcomes; assessment methods for determining the quality of student achievement in those areas; and an implementation for gaining faculty and departmental consent of the focus of the proposed institutional identity.

ISU Web-Site

Dr. Benjamin introduced Susan Owen, who is working on the ISU Web-site. Prior to coming to ISU, Susan managed and maintained the website for American College Testing, Inc.

A Web Advisory Committee has been charged with revamping the web site. Faculty and staff have been involved in a campus-wide effort with input from all sectors of the University. While there is still much to do, the dynamic new site is up and running, and Ms. Owen gave a brief demonstration.

Walk Through the Sycamores

Dr. Benjamin also reported on "Walk Through the Sycamores"- similar to Chicago's "Cows on Parade". This is the brainchild of John Lustig, Curator of ISU's Permanent collection. The event transforms the campus walkways into an exhibition of the public's creative talent. It is an exciting artistic and architectural happening that ties directly into engaging the community. Sponsors have been solicited and artists commissioned. All leaves, sponsors, and artists will be featured in an attractive full-color booklet.

Recognitions

Coach Vernon Croft of the women's soccer program was introduced. The National Coaches Association of America announced that ISU's women's soccer team finished the 2001 season fourth among 280 Division I participating women's soccer programs for academic achievements. ISU's student soccer athletes earned a 3.52 grade point average during the fall semester. It is the first time the program has earned this honor. The women's soccer program heads into its 3rd year of intercollegiate competition in the fall of 2002.

The Verizon Scholar Athletes Banquet was recently held. Chris Sapp, football, and Melanie Newnum, softball, received the "Presidential Scholar Athlete of the Year Award." Twelve scholar athletes were nominated for this prestigious honor.

During the Annual President's Scholars Banquet, these outstanding students, their families, faculty mentors, and donors were recognized. President Benjamin thanked the faculty mentors for their dedication to these students and the donors whose generous support makes the program possible.

Julie Wineinger, junior public relations major from Clinton won honorable mention in PRWEEK Magazine's "Student of the Year" 2002 competition. She was awarded \$1,000 and a paid internship in New York City at Weber Shandwick Worldwide, the largest public relations agency in the world. Dr. Benjamin also recognized Adriane Shaw, a freshmen public relations major and intern in the Office of Public Affairs, who wrote the feature on Ms. Wineinger. Julie Wineinger's faculty mentor is Dr. Debra Worley, Associate Professor of Public Relations in the Department of Communication.

Power Plant Award

President Benjamin noted that the Consulting Engineers Council of the State of Iowa has selected the new ISU power plant for its "Grand Conceptor Award" in the 2002 Engineering Excellence Awards competition. This is the top award in the large budget category. Past awards have already included the National

Recognition Award presented by the American Council of Engineering Companies; "Project of the Year Award" from the Industrial Category by Midwest Construction Magazine; and "Outstanding Concrete Achievement Award" from the Indiana Redi-Mix Concrete Association. In July, the power plant will be submitted in the Projects of the Year Awards Program sponsored by Power Engineering Magazine. Congratulations to Stanley Consultants, Inc., and to our own engineering staff. The ISU power plant is a showcase facility that will serve as a guide for other institutions for years to come.

University Advancement Announces Major Gift

Dr. Benjamin announced that the ISU Foundation has received an anonymous gift of \$2.2 million dollars, the second largest gift ever to Indiana State University. At the request of the donors, this gift will be used to develop a variety of support services for providing a comprehensive University experience exclusively for commuting and transfer students. Also at the request of the donors, a portion of this gift will go to endow book scholarships or technology learning tools for women athletes at ISU. The donors indicated that this support underscores their deep appreciation for and confidence in Indiana State University, and that the excellent programs and caring for students offered ensures success for those who take full advantage of the opportunities here. Their request for anonymity until an appropriate future date will be honored.

Academic Affairs

Dr. Pontius commented that this was a year of implementation for various items that were articulated in the NCA Self Study, Strategic Plan and the President's Fall Address. He thanked the faculty and the Academic Affairs staff for the hard work. Deans for the School of Business, the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Graduate School were hired and a woman was added to the Dean's Council. Two other searches for Dean of Library Services and Chief Information Officer for Information Technology are underway. Dr. Pontius also indicated 50 faculty position searches were being completed.

The Provost then briefly discussed Student Outcomes Assessment, Student Credit Hours, Program Array Review and Student Enrollment. The enrollment plan is being reviewed.

Mr. Bonds inquired as to the number of diverse candidates included in the 50 faculty positions to be filled. He requested a report at the next meeting.

American Humanics

Dr. Jensen introduced Nancy Rogers, Associate Professor in the Department of Recreation and Sport Management, who has provided leadership in getting the American Humanics Program organized on the campus.

Dr. Rogers distributed a handout describing the program and a Certification Competency Requirements Handbook. American Humanics is a non-profit organization. This program will offer opportunities for ISU and its students to be engaged in community service work. The program will be beneficial for the students as well as the organizations served.

E. REPORT OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY SENATE CHAIRPERSON
(Dr. Cerny)

Dr. Cerny reported that elections for the University Faculty Senate have been conducted. The newly elected senators represent the broad range of faculty throughout the University. The new Senate has also elected its Executive Committee and officers for 2002-03. Scott Davis, Veda Gregory, Jeff Harper, Paul Hightower, Richard Schneirov, and Ed Warner were elected to the Executive Committee with Frank Bell serving as vice-chairperson and Harriet Hudson serving as secretary; Dr. Cerny was re-elected as chairperson.

Dr. Cerny acknowledged the outstanding work of the current members of the Executive Committee. Special recognition is deserved for the officers who have labored long and diligently on the current Executive Committee. Dr. Cerny extended thanks to Ed Warner, parliamentarian; Steve Lamb, vice-chairperson; and Charles Hoffman, secretary.

Since the last Board meeting the Senate has met twice and approved the 2004-05 academic calendar, made recommendations on salaries for full-time non-tenure track faculty and part-time temporary faculty; parking fees for non-tenure faculty; retirement contributions for faculty summer work; and the provision for 10% early cash withdrawal from TIAA-CREF accumulations after age 59.5 years under certain circumstances. Also approved by the Senate were changes in the titles of faculty in the library; changes in the constitutions of two schools; clarified several policy statements in the University Handbook, and set summer meeting dates for several committees. In addition, the Executive Committee has completed work on a new workload policy and continues its efforts to develop the procedures and guidelines manual to accompany the proposed policy.

The faculty, as a whole, and the Senate, in particular, remain enthusiastic about making changes to improve the quality and quantity of educational opportunities at Indiana State University. There is a long list of cooperative and timely changes

that were initiated by the faculty and represent a cooperative effort between trustees, administration, and faculty. The faculty continues to be ready and willing to work with the administration and the trustees for changes that enhance the quality of education and the health and growth of the University.

With the agenda for the trustee meeting a packet of material from the University Faculty Senate included the results of the 2002 Professional Satisfaction Survey; the annual administrative/faculty count; a chart showing the growth changes in students, faculty, non-teaching administrative and professional administrative positions at ISU from 1995 to 2000; and the most recent salary and compensation comparison of ISU faculty with other faculty in the peer group.

Dr. Cerny felt that all of the data and references mirror the major issues that have produced the unprecedented dissatisfaction reported by faculty in the professional satisfaction survey. He was pleased that the trustees and the administration have expressed a willingness to hear the faculty concerns. Hearing the concerns is a first step, but it is not a sufficient response because most of the issues have been raised repeatedly in the past. The faculty expects to engage in continuing the meaningful dialogue with the administration to arrive at a satisfactory, written agreement on ways to improve communication, deal fairly and quickly with compensation issues, revisit the decision-making process on sabbatical leaves, and respect the primary authority of the faculty in all matters of curriculum.

F. REPORT OF THE STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT
(Kelle Thomas)

Kellee Thomas was not able to attend the meeting. Kier Hopkins-Smith reported on her behalf.

Since this is the end of the year, all the students are involved with finals, but next year SGA wants to do a lot of positive things on campus. With opening of the school year SGA wants to let the freshmen know the importance of student government and get them involved in campus activities.

G. REPORT OF THE SUPPORT STAFF COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON (Ms. Gabey)

Ms. Gabey, on behalf of the Support Staff at ISU, commended Kristin Garing for her distinguished service as President of the Student Government Association during 2000-02. As a student and as a leader of students, Kristin has left a legacy for all who follow to emulate. She congratulated Kristin on completing her course of study and wished her well as she begins a career in business.

Ms. Gabey also offered congratulations and best wishes to all students who will receive degrees at commencement on May 4.

The Support Staff Council Scholarship Committee has met and selected recipients of Support Staff Scholarships for the upcoming academic year. These staff/students will be notified of the awards at the annual general meeting of the support staff in May. Ms. Gabey encouraged support for and participation in this opportunity to provide educational opportunities for members of the ISU Support Staff.

An article from Postal World featured the mail service at Indiana State University. This example of support staff finding ways to cut costs is worthy of attention in these lean fiscal times for all institutions of higher learning.

As the administration continues to struggle with budget issues, costs to students should be foremost in mind. While an increase in salary is hoped for, support staff realize there are many areas competing for the limited dollars available to the University and support those who must make difficult decisions.

H. RECOGNITION OF SERVICE – KRISTIN K. GARING (Mrs. House)

The following Resolution was presented in recognition of service to Indiana State University by Kristin K. Garing, student and President of the Student Government Association:

WHEREAS, Kristin K. Garing has ably served as a member of the Student Government Association, was elected by the student body and served as President of SGA during the 2000-01 and 2001-02 academic years; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Garing has been successful in her academic endeavors in her field of study at the University and has represented the student body to the Board of Trustees in her role as President of the Student Government Association; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Garing has served on numerous committees and has provided valuable advice to the University administration;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Indiana State University Board of Trustees expresses grateful recognition and commendation to Kristin K. Garing for her leadership role as a student and her service to Indiana State University.

Recommendation: Approval of the Resolution.

On a motion by Mr. Fleetwood, seconded by Dr. Zietlow, the recommendation was approved.

On a motion by Dr. Zietlow, seconded by Mr. Alley, the recommendation was approved.

J. CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES (Dr. Pontius)

Candidates for graduate and undergraduate degrees to be conferred on May 4, 2002, are presented in Exhibit A.

Recommendation: Approval of the conferral of graduate and undergraduate degrees subject to completion of the requirements.

On a motion by Mr. Huntsinger, seconded by Mr. Bonds, the recommendation was approved.

K. PARKING PERMIT FEES, 2002-03 (Dr. Elsey)

In June 1995, the Board of Trustees accepted a long-range parking master plan which was designed to generate revenue to improve and maintain campus parking lots. The plan called for an annual increase in parking permit fees for a period of ten years.

Parking fees proposed for 2002-03, as called for in the plan are as follows:

Faculty/Monthly Staff	\$95.00
Support Staff	\$80.00
Students	\$80.00
Motorcycles	\$40.00

Parking permit fees for full time staff may be paid through payroll either before or after taxes at the choice of the staff member.

Recommendation: Approval of the parking permit fees as listed above for 2002-03, effective August 16, 2002.

On a motion by Mr. Fleetwood, seconded the Mr. Huntsinger, the recommendation was approved.

L. PARKING FINE INCREASES (Dr. Elsey)

This increase keeps Indiana State University's parking fine schedule in line with other area universities and ensures that the parking fines will continue to serve as a deterrent to potential violators.

Recommendation: Approval of the parking fine increases as listed above for 2002-03, effective August 16, 2002.

On a motion by Mr. Bonds, seconded by Mr. Alley, the recommendation was approved.

M. STUDENT HEALTH INSURANCE MASTER CONTRACT, 2002-03
(Dr. Elsey)

Student group health insurance is currently provided by Student Resources, a Division of The MEGA Life and Health Insurance Company. This contract expires August 22, 2002.

The following changes will be included in the 2002-03 student insurance plans without an increase in premiums:

1. Day surgery miscellaneous benefits have been changed from 80% of usual and customary/\$800 maximum to 100% of usual and customary/\$800 maximum.

2. The deductible has been changed from \$50 for each injury or sickness to \$50 per policy year.
3. Lifeguard Emergency Travel, Inc. now provides the repatriation and medical evacuation benefits.

The premium will be \$452 per year. This is an increase of \$12 over last year. Yearly increases are based on the claim/loss ratio. Indiana State has a high loss ratio due to the low number of students enrolling in the plan.

On April 2, 2001, a three-year renewable policy, which would set the next bidding period for 2004-05, was approved. This renewal coverage period will be August 22, 2002 through August 22, 2003.

Recommendation: Award of coverage of the student health insurance contract to Student Resources, a Division of The MEGA Life and Health Insurance company for the period of August 22, 2002 through August 22, 2003.

On a motion by Mr. Alley, seconded by Mr. Huntsinger, the recommendation was approved.

N. ATHLETIC TICKET PRICES FOR 2002-03 (Dr. Elsey)

Athletic ticket prices for 2002-03 are presented in Exhibit B.

These prices include a \$1.00 increase for single session tickets for all sports except men's basketball and a change in price for women's basketball season tickets. The overall price of women's basketball season tickets was reduced from \$45 to \$30 with an additional \$5.00 reduction for faculty, staff, and senior citizens.

We will no longer provide a free women's basketball season ticket with the purchase of men's basketball season tickets. We will, however, offer a \$5.00 reduction in the price if patrons purchase a season ticket to both men's and women's basketball.

These requested changes in women's basketball ticket prices are based upon a MVC survey and a need to continue to address revenue challenges in intercollegiate athletics.

Recommendation: Approval of the 2002-03 athletic ticket prices presented In Exhibit B.

On a motion by Dr. Zietlow, seconded by Mr. Alley, the recommendation was approved.

O. STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION RESTRUCTURING
(Dr. Elsey)

The Student Government Association at Indiana State University has a long and distinguished tradition of service to the University, its students, and the Terre Haute community. Much has been accomplished in their tenure as the solitary governmental system for students on campus including such distinguished university projects as the formation of the blue safety lights on campus, the Sycamore Psychos, the Inactive Organizational Project, and the online elections.

All of these projects could not have been accomplished without the Student Senate, the legislative body of student government which represents the students. However, of the nearly 45 senatorial seats available, only an average of 15-18 are continuously filled. This means that only 18 students make wide-ranging decisions for nearly 11,500 students. The Student Senate is structured to have senators that represent on campus and commuter needs. Commuter representation has been lacking. On campus seats available are filled.

By restructuring the Student Senate a diversified and more representative Senate can be created. Each academic school will be allotted a certain number of senate seats based on the Ten-Day Official Report. The result of this restructuring will be the fulfillment of the Student Government Association's mission statement, which states SGA exists to "provide a forum for the interests, to maintain academic freedom, academic responsibility...and to foster recognition of the rights of students in this University." Student interests go beyond residential and commuter concerns. Restructuring will allow the student government to better represent the concerns of the students and to make better informed decisions that affect students.

The newly structured Student Senate will become effective in the 2003 student government online elections.

Recommendation: Approval of the Student Government Association restructuring presented in Exhibit C.

On a motion by Dr Zietlow, seconded by Mr. Huntsinger, the recommendation was approved.

P. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SAFETY NAME CHANGE (Dr. Pontius)

Upon the recommendation of the Academic Affairs Committee, the faculty of the Department of Health and Safety has voted to change the name of the department to Department of Health, Safety, and Environmental Health Sciences. This change will better reflect the programs offered in the department and will be beneficial in student recruitment.

Recommendation: Approval to change the name of the Department of Health and Safety to Department of Health, Safety, and Environmental Health Sciences.

On a motion by Mr. Dooley, seconded by Mr. Bonds, the recommendation was approved.

Q. PURCHASES OVER \$250,000 (Mr. Schafer)

Under the Indiana State University Purchasing Guidelines any purchases/ contracts over \$250,000 are to be submitted for approval by the Board of Trustees. The following purchase is submitted for approval:

CDI, Inc., P0039483, \$774,900.00, Science Laboratory Renovations

Recommendation: Approval of the renovation contract.

On a motion by Mr. Bonds, seconded by Mr. Huntsinger, the recommendation was approved.

On a motion by Mr. Fleetwood, seconded by Mr. Alley, the recommendation was approved.

S. STUDENT ACADEMIC SEMESTER FEES, 2002-03 (Ms. Sacopulos)

Recommendation: Approval of the academic student fee schedule beginning with Fall 2002 through Summer II, 2003, presented in Exhibit E. A temporary increase in the technology fee of \$25.00 per semester per capita is recommended.

On a motion by Mr. Fleetwood, seconded by Dr. Zietlow, the recommendation was approved.

Mrs. House indicated it is with reluctance that the Board must increase student fees. This University is a good university and the value of the education received is worth the increase. The Legislature will meet again in May but we know there is no relief in sight. Other universities are raising fees higher than the increase at ISU. By approving fees now, this will help families plan for the financial part of their education for next fall.

Mr. Hopkins-Smith noted there is not much time to warn students what is about to happen. Financial aid by far is not enough. Mrs. House commented that not every student receives financial aid. This helps to benefit those students not receiving financial aid. Some people need more help that is why the University is increasing the financial aid allocation in the annual budget.

Mr. Huntsinger commended the Board for their consideration of the students. Any time the Board approves an increase he felt it is done as a last resort. This is a small price to pay for the great education ISU students receive.

Dr. Quatroche also stated there is some financial aid available through the ISU Foundation.

Mr. Bonds wondered if there is some way the University can provide additional assistance with financial aid and available funds to provide additional information to students and their families.

- Whereas: The Indiana State University Student Senate is an integral part of the governance of the ISU Student Community.
- Whereas: The ISU Student Senate is not routinely filled to its maximum capacity therefore not an accurate representation of the student population.

- Enacted: Article VI, Section 2; Be Amended to Read:

- Enacted: Article VI, Section 7; Be Amended to Read:
"Senators must be enrolled in the school they represent. Residency-at-large Senators must live in the area they represent. The Greek Housing Senator must live in a Fraternity/Sorority House."

"The number of Senators elected shall be:

CONSTITUTION
of the
STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION
of
INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY

PREAMBLE

We, the members of the Student Government Association of Indiana State University of Terre Haute, Indiana, desiring to provide a form of government for the supervision of student activities; to provide a forum for the expression of student views and interests; to maintain academic freedom, academic responsibility, and student rights; to improve student social, cultural and physical welfare; to maintain educational standards, facilities and teaching methods; to promote national and international understanding and fellowship at the student level; and to foster recognition of the rights of students in this school and in this community, do hereby establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE I
Name and Purpose

Section 1:

The name of the official student governing body at Indiana State University will be the Student Government Association.

Section 2:

The purposes of the Student Government Association are those stated in the Preamble of this Constitution.

ARTICLE II
Membership

All students currently enrolled for University credit shall be, by implicit consent, members of the Student Government Association of Indiana State University.

ARTICLE III
Division of Government

Section 1:

The Student Government Association will be organized into three branches. They shall be the Executive, the Legislative, and the Judicial. Their powers and duties are those mandated by the respective articles of this Constitution.

Section 2:

No person or group of persons in one of these branches will exercise any power belonging to the other, except as hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

ARTICLE IV
Student Rights

Section 1:

These definitions will be used by the Student Government Association to identify the components of the University community:

- A. Indiana State University or the University is defined as the institution composed of the Board of Trustees, the Administration, the Faculty, and the Students of Indiana State University.
- B. The Board of Trustees is defined as the governing body of the University deriving its powers from the laws of the State of Indiana.
- C. The Administration is defined as the administrative appointees at the University.
- D. The Faculty is defined as those persons appointed primarily for the purpose of conducting classroom activities.
- E. Students are defined as all persons currently enrolled for University credit.
- F. Student laws are defined as those rules and procedures legally adopted by the Student Government Association.

Section 2:

Students have the right of access to higher education according to these guidelines:

- A. No person will be denied admission, re-admission or graduation at Indiana State University or any school, department, or division thereof, on the basis of gender, race, creed, religion, national origin, veterans status, sexual orientation, personal beliefs, personal opinions or differently-abled status.
- B. No person will be denied admission, re-admission, or graduation at Indiana State University or any school, department, or division thereof, for failure or refusal to submit information concerning gender, race, creed, religion, national origin, veterans status, sexual orientation, personal beliefs, personal opinions, or differently-abled status.
- C. Any student has the right to enroll in any available class or course offered at Indiana State University for which they are willing and able to pay tuition and for which they have fulfilled the University prerequisites.
- D. No persons will be denied admission, re-admission, or graduation at Indiana State University for refusal or failure to surrender any rights, freedoms, or privileges guaranteed or granted to them by the Constitution or the laws of the United States, or the Constitution or the laws of the State of Indiana.

Section 3:

The academic rights of students shall be:

- A. Students have the right to know their academic standing and the criteria upon which they are being evaluated in any course in which they are enrolled. Students have the right to be evaluated solely upon the stated criteria for any course in which they are enrolled. Students have the right to a syllabus and/or course outline, which shall include grading system, test schedule, reading assignment schedule, and a list of any special projects or research papers required. Changes in the syllabus during the course of the semester should be communicated to students in a timely fashion.
- B. The professor in the classroom and in conference shall encourage free discussion, inquiry and expression. Student performance shall be evaluated solely upon an academic basis, not upon opinions or conduct in matters unrelated to academic standards. Students shall be free to take reasoned disagreement to the data or views offered in any course of study and to reserve judgment about matters of opinion, but students are responsible for learning the content of any course of study in which they are enrolled.
- C. Students shall have protection through established procedures against prejudiced or capricious academic evaluation. At the same time, they are responsible for maintaining standards of academic performance established for each course in which they are enrolled.
- D. Students have the right to a reasonable expectation of faculty performance as set forth in the Indiana State University Faculty Handbook.

Section 4:

Student rights of assembly and association shall be:

- A. Students have the right to assemble peaceably on University owned property, subject to lawful regulation by the University.
- B. Students have the right to organize and join associations to promote their common interests.
- C. No student organization will be refused the right to exist or have its right to exist revoked without due process of student law.
- D. Students and student organizations have the right to examine, criticize, and discuss questions of interest publicly and privately.
- E. Organizations have the right to establish requirements for their own membership except on the basis of race, creed, color, national origin, or gender except for exceptions made under Title IX of the Federal Educational Amendments.
- F. Except as stated in this Constitution, neither the University nor the Student Government Association, nor any part of either, shall determine internal policies of any specific organization.
- G. The student press should be free of censorship and advance approval of copy, and its editors and managers should be free to develop their own news coverage and editorial policies.

- H. **Editors and managers of student publications should be protected from arbitrary suspension and removal because of editorial policy or content. Only for proper and stated causes should editors and managers be subject to removal and then by orderly and prescribed procedures. The agency responsible for the appointment of editors and managers should be the agency responsible for their removal.**
- I. **All University published and financed student publications should explicitly state on the editorial page that the opinions there expressed are not necessarily those of the University or student body.**

Section 5:

Students have the right to formal participation in a student government of their own design by means of which they may express their opinions and by which they may effect these opinions. Students shall have a means by which they may determine the structure of said government.

Section 6:

The rights of students in University disciplinary procedures shall be:

- A. **The appropriate University due process will be observed in all disciplinary situations which might result in a change of the student status or standing.**
- B. **University disciplinary action is not taken by the University simply to duplicate the judgment of civil law, but to serve the purposes peculiar to the University community.**
- C. **The University shall not institute disciplinary action against a student for off-campus conduct, criminal or otherwise, except in the case of a serious threat to the welfare or safety of persons and property.**
- D. **Criminal conduct on the campus may subject a student to prosecution by civil authorities.**
- E. **Within the guidelines of University due process, a student accused of violations of University rules, regulations, or policies shall have the right to have a charge brought to bear within six (6) months after a complaint is brought before the appropriate official of the Administration.**
- F. **A student has the right to know whether or not statements that they may make in disciplinary or counseling situations can be used in student courts, administrative procedures, or civil courts.**
- G. **Hearings need not be delayed until after a student has been tried of any concurrent criminal charges. Students who have concurrent criminal charges pending against them, however, should be permitted to consult with counsel during their disciplinary hearings. The role of counsel will be limited to consultation.**
- H. **A student shall have the right to have their interim suspension reviewed by the All-University Court within five (5) school days after that suspension shall take effect; such review shall be conducted by the All-University Court or such alternate system as has been provided by this Constitution.**
- I. **A student subjected to interim suspension, and later exonerated, shall have the right to appeal to**

the All-University or other specified Court to request that the University do every reasonable thing within its power to see that the student is not unduly damaged by the interim suspension.

- J. Neither the University nor the Student Government Association nor any part of either shall make a rule, regulation, or law which shall deny any student of the rights, freedoms, or privileges guaranteed as granted by the United States Constitution or the laws under it, or the State of Indiana Constitution or the laws under it. Nor, will any rule, regulation, or law be construed or interpreted as denial of such rights and privileges.
- K. Except under extreme circumstances neither the property occupied by a student, nor the person of a student, nor their personal possessions will be searched or seized by representatives, agents, employees, or other persons acting for the University without one of the following: permission of the student, permission of the designated University official(s) or legal search warrant.
- L. All students accused of violation of University rules, regulations, or student law shall be considered innocent until found guilty. The mere accusation of a violation shall in no way be construed as to limit the rights or privileges of the student, except in the case of a serious threat to the welfare or safety of persons or property.
- M. A person who files a complaint against a student for violation of University rules, regulations, or student law shall have the right, upon request, to be informed: 1) if a charge has been filed as a result of the complaint, 2) if a hearing has been held, and 3) the result of a hearing.
- N. Students shall have the right of access to all University rules, regulations, student laws, and all documents covered under the Open Door law of the State of Indiana.
- O. Within the guidelines of University due process, a student accused of violations of University rules, regulations, or policies shall have the right to choose between the Student Court System and the Administrative Hearing System for adjudication, when the Student Court system is functioning.

ARTICLE V

The Executive Branch

Section 1:

The executive officers of the Student Government Association shall include the President, Vice President, Treasurer, and other officers as deemed necessary by the Senate. All executive powers are vested in such officers.

Section 2:

The President shall have no vote in the Senate.

Section 3:

The President shall have veto power over all resolutions and legislation of the SGA Senate, although the Senate may override such veto by a two-thirds vote of the current Senate membership.

Section 4:

The order of succession shall be President, Vice-President and President Pro-Tempore.

ARTICLE VI
The Legislative Branch

Section 1:

All legislative power granted herein shall be vested in, and exercised by, the Student Senate of the Student Government Association of Indiana State University.

~~Section 2:~~

The Student Senate shall be composed of Residence Hall, Commuter and Fraternity Housing Senators who shall have voting power, and speaking seats which shall have no voting power.

Section 3:

Senators shall represent the constituents of the area from which they were elected.

Section 4:

All organizations registered with the Student Government Association, as well as the Administration, Faculty and the Indiana Statesman shall be granted speaking seats as designated by the Student Government Code.

Section 5:

The officers of the Student Senate shall be:

A. President of the Student Senate.

1. The Vice President of the Student Government Association shall serve as the President of the Student Senate.
2. The President of the Student Senate shall call and preside over meetings of the Student Senate.
3. The President of the Student Senate may vote on proposed legislation only to break a tie.
4. The President of the Senate shall appoint all Senate Committees.

B. President Pro-Tempore of the Student Senate.

1. The Student Senate shall elect a President Pro-Tempore from among the Senators by a majority of the voting membership.
2. The President Pro-Tempore shall preside over all meetings in the absence of the President of the Student Senate.

C. Secretary of the Student Senate.

1. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President of the Student Senate with the approval of two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate.
2. The Secretary may hold no other Student Government position and shall have no vote in the Senate.
3. The Secretary shall take the minutes of Senate meetings and perform other duties as set forth by the Student Government Vice President.

Section 6:

All members of the Student Senate must submit a signed Release of Information Form to verify that they meet the following qualifications during their term of office and in order to be a candidate for Senator:

- A. Enrollment for University credit.
- B. Good conduct standing with the University.
- C. A cumulative grade point average of 2.0 or above.

The Student Senate shall be the sole judge of other qualifications of its members.

~~Section 7~~

Residence hall Senators must reside in the hall they represent. No student living in Fraternity Housing or a residence hall may be elected or appointed a Commuter Senator.

Section 8:

Two-thirds of the voting membership of the Student Senate shall constitute a quorum.

Section 9:

The Senate may determine the rules of its proceedings and shall keep an official record of these proceedings.

Section 10:

Upon petition of five (5) percent of the student body, any legislation which they (the petitioners) deem necessary shall be submitted to the student body at the next all-campus election. If accepted, this legislation will have the same standing as any legislation passed by the Student Senate and signed by the President. One-third of the voting membership of the Student Senate may submit any legislation to the members of the Student Government Association at the next all-campus election. If approved, such legislation shall have the same standing as any legislation passed by the Student Senate and signed by the President.

Section 11:

The Student Senate shall have the power to:

- A. Establish regulations affecting student elections which are open to all members of the student

body.

- B. Establish criteria for registration of campus organizations.
- C. Impeach Student Justices by a two-thirds vote of the voting members of the Student Senate, for malfeasance in office and dereliction of duty.
- D. Try Student Justices, after their impeachment. Conviction will be by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the voting membership of the Student Senate.
- E. Effect by two-thirds of the voting membership the impeachment of the President or Vice President of the Student Government Association or any other executive officer.
- F. Approve all student nominations, who represent SGA to University Committees and all other committees which provide for student representation.
- G. Make all policies, establish Senate Offices, independent offices, and other paid positions unless otherwise prohibited by the Constitution, which shall be necessary to the exercise of the foregoing and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the Student Government Association.
- H. Elect the President, Vice President, and Commuter Senators of the Student Government Association if none are provided by an election as specified in this Constitution.
- I. Appoint student representatives, who represent SGA to the Faculty Senate and student members of the Faculty Senate Committees.
- J. Establish guidelines for any and all Student Senate Offices and independent offices.
- K. Approve, amend, or reject any and all proposed bills, resolutions, and/or motions under its consideration.
- L. May establish a Student Government Code.

Section 12:

Should a Senate seat become vacant, it may be filled in accordance with the Student Government Code.

ARTICLE VII
The Judicial Branch

Section 1: All judicial powers of the Student Government Association shall be vested in the Judicial Branch and such courts as the Senate shall establish.

Section 2: The Judicial Branch shall be empowered to review, upon request of a member of the student body, any document or action of the Student Government Association with regard to its constitutionality.

Section 3: The Judicial Branch shall be composed of members of the Student body.

ARTICLE VIII
Elections

Section 1:

An election for all elected SGA positions will be held on an annual basis in March.

Section 2:

Elected positions are SGA President, SGA Vice President and all SGA Senators.

Section 3:

Terms of office for all elected SGA positions shall begin on the last Wednesday in March and shall end on the last Tuesday in March of the following year.

Section 4:

A candidate for the Presidency or Vice-Presidency of the Student Government Association must:

- A. Be enrolled in at least 9 undergraduate hours or 6 graduate hours, be in good standing, and have a 2.5 or above grade point average. These requirements must also be maintained throughout the term of office.
- B. Have completed at least 36 hours of University credit.
- C. Have spent at least two (2) semesters as a student at Indiana State University. Enrollment in the first and second session of the Summer Term shall be considered as enrollment in a full academic semester.
- D. Submit a signed Release of Information Form their petition to run for office.

Section 5:

A student serving as President or Vice-President of the Student Government Association shall hold no other campus office or University administrative position.

~~Section 6:~~

The number of Senators elected shall be:

- A. One from each residence hall except Lincoln Quadrangles which shall elect two.
- B. One student from the Fraternity Housing.

C. A number from the commuter student population determined by the following formula:

Each year as of February 15, the Campus Elections Commission shall divide the number of commuter students by the average number of students living in a residence hall, except Lincoln Quad. The resultant number plus one for any major fraction thereof shall determine the number of Commuter Senators. Any information needed in determination of the number of Commuter Senators to be elected will be supplied by the appropriate administrative officials.

Section 7:

Any Executive Officer of the Student Government Association may be impeached for malfeasance or dereliction of duty in office and/or violation of articles of this Constitution. Impeachment procedures may be initiated by five Senators or by petition by 150 members of the student body. If the process results in impeachment by the Student Senate and such process is sustained by the Student Court, that officer of the SGA shall no longer hold or exercise the powers of that office.

Section 8

The resignation of an officer must be presented in writing at a regular meeting of the Student Senate at least two weeks prior to the time the resignation shall take effect; except in cases of pending impeachment, when an immediate resignation will be accepted.

ARTICLE IX

Finances

Student Government shall receive into its budget a certain percentage of the student fees and maintain control over specific expenditures subject to budgetary limitations and/or veto of the University President on the grounds of unlawful expenditure, but with the right of appeal to the Board of Trustees. All such expenditures shall be subject to the receipt, custody and accounting of the University Treasurer for the proper protection of University funds as contemplated by I.C. 20-12-56-4.

ARTICLE X

Adoption

Section 1:

Upon legal adoption, and approval by the ISU Board of Trustees, this Student Government Association Constitution in its entirety will supersede the previous Indiana State University Student Government Association Constitutions.

Section 2:

The Board of Trustees accepts this Constitution under the following conditions:

The Student Government Association Constitution shall not be construed as a relinquishment by the Indiana State University Board of Trustees of any of their rights, obligations, responsibilities and authorities conferred upon

them by the State of Indiana, nor shall this Constitution be construed as a relinquishment by said Board of Trustees to act in final judgement on the management of institutional affairs nor shall said Constitution be construed as a recognition by Indiana State University Board of Trustees of any right of any person or persons, association or organization to take any concrete action (including any kind of demonstration) to impede, or to threaten to impede, the Board of Trustees or Administration officials in proper and orderly management and operation of the University.

ARTICLE XI **Amendments**

Section 1:

Amendments to this Constitution will require a two-thirds vote of the Student Senate membership at two consecutive meetings following the first reading of said amendment, a vote of approval by the majority of those students who vote in the all-campus referendum called for that purpose, and approval of the Board of Trustees.

Section 2:

Whenever ten (10) percent of the members of the Student Government Association propose an amendment, that amendment will become binding and valid upon the majority approval of those students voting in the all-campus referendum called for that purpose, and approval of the Board of Trustees.
