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MINUTES INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES SEPTEMBER 28, 2007

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees met in regular session at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, September 28, 2007 in the State Room, Tirey Hall.

There being a quorum present, Mr. Alley called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m.

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On a motion by Mr. Shagley, seconded by Mr. Carpenter, the recommendation was approved.

C. REPORT OF THE BOARD PRESIDENT (Mr. Alley)

Mr. Alley welcomed Joyce Rogers to the Board.

He noted the Distinguished Alumni Banquet will be held in Hulman Center on October 19. This is a landmark event as it is the 50th Distinguished Alumni Banquet and a large crowd is expected. Homecoming will be held on October 20.

We are very pleased with the enrollment increase of 8.7 percent. Freshman enrollment is up for the second year in a row. Thanks to all the Admissions staff and to everyone for their efforts

The Board of Trustees held a retreat in Indianapolis on August 29. It was very productive with great discussion on many issues and we discussed priorities for last year. We have made great strides in the priorities that were set last year and we need to continue working on those priorities. Enrollment is and will continue to be our number one priority. Other priorities continue to be development of programs of preeminence and we are pleased with the progress made last year and will continue implementing them; diversify University funding from non-government sources; attracting top grade personnel; and economic development.

As we move into the search for a new University President, it is important for the campus community, the public and potential candidates to know that the Board of Trustees reaffirms its support for the strategic initiatives of experiential learning, community engagement and distinctive programs. We will incorporate these priorities into our search process and will seek candidates who can build upon the progress that has been made and will continue to advance these initiatives.

The University is in the midst of going forward with the 2010 North Central Association accreditation process. An important part of this process is reviewing the University's mission statement to ensure alignment with the University's strategic directions. Now that the program prioritization process is well under way and programs of distinction have been identified, it is time to refine the University's mission statement accordingly. The Board of Trustees charges the administration to work with the campus community to complete this task by January 2008 and bring it to the Trustees for consideration at our February 2008 meeting. Trustee LaPlante will serve as liaison to the NCA Review Committee working with Kevin Snider and Provost Maynard.

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This is only the first step of a long and involved process. It is a critically important process, one that is essential to our University's future. I ask that the entire campus community work collaboratively to ensure its success.

A search consultant has been selected to assist with the presidential search process. We anticipate the search committee would be complete around the third week in October. At that time we will pass on the definite charge to the committee and turn it over to Trustee Ron Carpenter, Chair of the Committee, for the process they will go through. I am pleased that we have broad representation from faculty, support staff, student government, alumni, foundation members and community members.

Mr. Alley said he had an opportunity to attend the Foundation meeting on September 20 and 21. Mr. and Mrs. Larry Boulet have agreed to serve in leadership roles in the Foundation capital campaign. They will do an outstanding job.

Mr. Alley said he had a delightful time interacting with the outstanding high school students who attended a reception at the Eiteljorg Museum recently. Thanks to John Beacon, Vice President for Enrollment Management, Marketing and Communications and the Admissions staff for orchestrating this event. These are some extraordinary young people and they are very interested in ISU.

A reception for Greg Goode will be held this afternoon beginning at 1:00 p.m. in the Heritage Lounge. Greg has been a great asset to ISU and this has allowed us to achieve many things. He has great rapport with legislators and the community.

ISU Networks hosted a foreclosure summit in Chicago on August 28. This represents the important programs we have at the University. There are many wonderful things going on at the University and the Trustees are pleased to be part of that. We are only beginning to achieve the preeminence that will be ours.

D. REPORT OF THE FACULTY SENATE CHAIRPERSON (Dr. Sheets)

I'm honored to be here to present my first report to you as Chair of the 2007-2008 Indiana State University Faculty Senate.

As we meet today, the fall semester is well underway.

The faculty returned from their summer activities in mid-August to the now traditional, end-of-summer picnic hosted by the administration. This is a well-

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attended and much-appreciated event for the campus community to "come together" in anticipation of the new year.

The Committee on Committees met over the summer to appoint membership to the 8 standing committees as well as to several university committees. Two weeks ago, charges were sent out to each standing committee. In addition to carryover charges from last year, including such things as to review the proposed Background Check procedures for new faculty hires and to evaluate the value of instituting minus grades, are new charges such as to explore changes in the academic calendar to resolve issues related to study week, changes in class scheduling to facilitate students' involvement in internships and other service activities, and changes in academic advising and other services to promote greater success and retention of first-year students. We also sent charges related to our handbook responsibilities to review governing documents for the College of Nursing, Health, and Human Services and to provide advice on the budget and the facilities master plan.

As you may know, there is a faculty taskforce created last year to review our General Education Program, and several committees are being formed to begin preparing for NCA.

It thus promises to be a very busy year.

At the request of Trustee Alley, and following the University Handbook, the first charge given to the Administrative Affairs Committee was to generate a slate of 5 faculty representatives to the Presidential Search Committee. Working from a list of about 20 nominees, they identified five faculty who represent diversity in discipline, rank, time at ISU, pedagogy (that is, distance versus face-to-face modes of instruction) as well as demographics. This slate was approved by the Administrative Affairs Committee; the Senate Executive Committee, and by the Faculty Senate. The Administrative Affairs Committee, led this year by Gordon Minty, is to be commended for its work. All five individuals are well-respected across campus. I am confident that they will work collaboratively with Trustee Carpenter and the rest of the committee to ensure that the best of possible candidates for ISU are selected.

The new President will be coming at an opportune time. ISU is strong. Although we still have many challenges (most notably, improving retention and preparing for NCA review), the campus mood is optimistic. Our growth in freshmen enrollment gives us confidence that we have turned the tide on recent losses, and the campus is looking forward to a bright future.

Related to this, President Benjamin recently gave his Fall address to the campus, entitled "Reflecting on the Future." In it, the President reviewed campus

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achievements during his tenure, including many improvements to our physical plant: the renovation of Stalker and University Halls, the 7th Street Arts Corridor, the Cherry Street Transportation Facility, and the new Student Recreation Center. I want to end today by expressing my personal appreciation for these changes. A proud university merits a proud campus, and these projects will be sources of pride for many years hence.

E. REPORT OF THE SUPPORT STAFF COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON (Ms. Hall)

Ms. Hall reported that two major events were held by the Council this month. The Support Staff Picnic was held on Saturday, September 8th. The event was a success and was enjoyed by support staff and their families. The Council would like to thank the Foundation, Kevin Hoolehan and his staff, Vice President Floyd, and the Public Relations Committee for their organization, participation, and support of the picnic.

On September 20th the Council held their annual soup and sandwich sale, which is a fundraiser for the Support Staff scholarship. All proceeds of the event go to fund scholarships for Support Staff. The event raised more than \$1,450.00. The Council would like to once again thank all members of the Scholarship Committee, Wil Downs, Candy Barton, and Mark Frederick who volunteered to help serve, and all staff, faculty, and students who attended the event.

The Council is moving forward with accomplishing the goals that were set for 2007.

The #1 goal is Marketing the Council. Phase one of this goal was the announcement of our new slogan and logo. Support Staff Council...Your Voice in the Crowd. The slogan was chosen from over 40 entries to a contest. The winning entry was submitted by Sondra Wilkison, Office of Sponsored Program. The logo was designed by Kristen Althoff, Hulman Center. This is the first step in achieving our goal of marketing the Council.

Goal #2 is a true working Council office, an office with a student assistant, office hours, and all information provided for staff. Our first step in that direction has been hiring a MAPS student for the office. Stacey Richardson is a junior majoring in Criminology and will be working in our office this year. We are excited to have Stacey and she has been a welcome addition to our Council. She will be attending meetings with me this year and is helping out on all Council committees.

Finally, our #3 goal is improved communication with staff. To help achieve that goal, we are taking the Council to the campus. The REP Sessions this year will be

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held in different districts. The sessions are being held on October 3 and 4th and I look forward to reporting to you at the next meeting on the topics discussed at those events.

F. REPORT OF THE STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT (Mr. Patton)

Mr. Patton welcomed Joyce Rogers and Dr. Sheets.

He reported that SGA will host a conference in January and everyone has been busy working on that event.

Recently Student Government has been working with Dr. Ed Kinley, Associate Vice President and Chief Information Officer, on ways to improve our technology issues. It is a pleasure working with him.

SGA is excited about the bus initiative. A ribbon cutting will be held on Wolfe Field on October 2 at 10:00 a.m.

Constitution Day was held on September 17. Approximately 50-75 students attended. Students enjoyed the opportunity to have discussion on the constitution and government. The Vice Presidents were there and we enjoyed the time together.

Congratulations to all members of the Admissions staff for their work in growing freshman enrollment and building on last years success. We are also pleased with graduate enrollment numbers..

G. REPORT OF THE UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT (Dr. Benjamin)

President Benjamin noted an article on the Money Bus at the Trustees seats. The Money Bus was created by the ISU Networks Financial Services and is in its second year of making rounds to schools in Indiana with great success. It is great fun and a tie to learning about financial literacy. What we are doing in the College of Business and Networks is very important.

The semester is well underway, and as most of you are already aware, we are pleased to start off the year with positive enrollment news, including an 8.7 percent increase in first-time freshmen and graduate enrollment again at record levels.

The entire campus has worked very hard on the recruitment and retention of students. It remains our top priority as I indicated in my annual fall address two

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weeks ago. We are pleased with the progress we have made, but know that the work must continue.

Vice President John Beacon made a brief power point presentation on the fall 2007 enrollment and said that many people worked very hard to make this happen. Mr. Beacon said he is focusing a great deal of his time to retention. We need to be sure students are receiving the attention they need.

<u>First-time</u>, New Students:

6246 admission applications were received – a 20% increase in admission applications over last year (1042 more applications)

149 more students enrolled this year than last – an 8.7% increase over last year (1852 students)

72% of applicants were admissible

Changes over the past five years:

The average high school cumulative GPA has increased from 2.88 to 3.02 The Core 40 completion rate has grown from 77.5% to 90.4% The average SAT has improved by 9 points to 958.9

Changes for 2007:

3.0 to 3.49 is the fastest growing high school GPA range: from 34.2% of our enrolled students in 2005, to 40.3% in 2007

Since last fall, in-state enrollment has grown 9.6% (or 144 students) from 1494 to 1638; out-of-state decreases by one student from 189 to 188

Ethnicity has increased in all categories – African American: from 256 to 271 (5.9%)

Hispanic: from 19 to 33 (73.7%)

Native American: from 2 to 5 (150%) Total Minority: from 294 to 324 (10.2%)

Transfer Students

1851 applications were received – a 5% increase over last year (88 more students) 1088 applicants were admitted – 164 fewer than last year

57% of admits enrolled (629 students)

37 fewer transfer students enrolled this year than last

President Benjamin reported that we recently had a unique opportunity to continue to spread awareness of Indiana State and build relationships with our target audiences. Earlier this month, Indiana State served as the premier sponsor for the Terre Haute Air Show. We hosted prospective and current students, faculty, staff, alumni and donors throughout the two days of the fair. Cosponsored by the Indiana State University Foundation, the fair could easily be considered one of the largest alumni events of the year, second only to Homecoming. It was a tremendous weekend with great entertainment, good food and great weather. Kevin Snider, Kevin Hoolehan and many others worked very hard to make this a worthwhile investment, and their efforts were met with much success.

Good News Items

The Air Fair wasn't the only successful fair this month. On September 12, the career centers of Indiana State and St. Mary-of-the Woods sponsored a Career Opportunity Fair for students, graduate students and alumni seeking career information, internships and professional positions.

A total of 123 companies participated in the Career Fair and more than 650 students attended. Career Center staff members were pleased to have a significant number of freshmen participating in the Fair, seeking career advice and/or internships.

The next Career Opportunity Fair will take place on February 6, and it is my understanding that the only concern is whether the facility will be large enough. Congratulations to Kent Waggoner and his entire staff for this success.

Eiteljorg Reception

I would like to thank the Foundation, Gene Crume, John Beacon, Richard Toomey and our alumni who hosted a reception at the Eiteljorg Museum last

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week for prospective students. We continue to work to increase our market share in the Indianapolis region, and this type of an event is key to those efforts.

Betsy Frank

In other good news, ISU Nursing Professor Betsy Frank has been named one of 41 fellows to the National League for Nursing's Academy of Nursing Education. The fellows were selected by the National League's Board of Governors.

Professor Frank was selected for her sustained and significant contributions to the field of nursing education. A member of ISU's nursing faculty since 1994, Dr. Frank has a bachelor's in nursing from the Ohio State University, a master's in medical-surgical nursing from the University of Washington and a Ph.D. in educational administration from the University of Utah.

Dr. Frank is currently in Phoenix for the national League of Nursing's Education Summit, during which she will be formally inducted into the Academy of Nursing Education

Emergency Alert System

On Thursday, a new emergency text messaging system was officially launched by the Office of Public Safety. The university has contracted with e2campus, a system which allows students, faculty and staff to sign up to receive emergency text messages via cell phone or e-mail and augments our other emergency communications vehicles such as the Novell popup-up alert message system, the 237-7777 information line, e-mail, the University website and our all-hazards siren system.

Bill Mercier, Ed Kinley, Teresa Exline, Bob Jefferson, Bill Herndon, C.J. Dukate-Nasser and Kelly Hall and others worked on the implementation of this new system of communication. While no system will ever be perfect, tragic events such as the one at Virginia Tech have reinforced the need to continually look for new ways to communicate in the event of a crisis. We hope we do not have to put this system to use for emergency alerts but we are prepared in the event we do.

Fulbright Commission

I am pleased to report that I have been invited by the Fulbright Commission to be a keynote speaker for the International Dialogue on Education Workshop next month in Berlin. I will be the representative from the United States participating in an international debate focusing on the quality of teaching and teacher education programs.

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HED Grant

Also on the international front, we recently received notification that Indiana State has been awarded a \$50,000 planning grant from Higher Education for Development to help the country of Morocco establish a national system of higher education accreditation. This is an outgrowth of our previous work with Moroccan institutions of higher education and continues to build Indiana State's reputation as an international leader in education reform. Provost Jack Maynard and Dean Brad Balch are assisting me in this project.

College of Technology Reorganization

Reform efforts are also continuing on our own campus. In today's agenda, you will be acting on a reorganization of the College of Technology from five departments to three. This is an outgrowth of the program prioritization process and will provide opportunities for greater synergy between similar programs ad their faculty, cost reductions that can be reallocated to other priorities, reduction of redundancies and increased potential for enrollment growth. I would like to commend Dean Tad Foster and the College of Technology for their work in leading this reorganization.

Nancy Merritt

We are pleased to welcome our new Dean of the College of Business today.

Dr. Maynard gave a brief summary of Dr. Merritt's background and said she has great leadership experience.

Dean Merritt said she is pleased to be here and has discovered many exciting things happening at the University and in the Terre Haute community and is looking forward to getting to other areas throughout the State.

Greg Goode

At 1:00 p.m. today, we will be gathering to recognize the exemplary service of Greg Goode who has so ably carried our message to Indianapolis, Washington and other locations. Greg has been an instrumental part of our success in securing funding for Stalker Hall, University Hall, the Cherry Street Multi-Modal Transportation Center and the Federal Building as well as approval for the Student Recreation Center. He has helped garner support for the Innovation Alliance Economic Development Initiative, renovation of our chemistry and life sciences labs and our nursing program. His ability to reach out and build relationships with local, statewide and federal officials and their staffs and his dedicated advocacy for Indiana State has truly benefited our University. We all

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owe him a debt of gratitude. One only has to walk outside to see the impact he has had on our campus. Today is, in fact his last day, and I hope that you will all join us in recognizing him both now and at the reception this afternoon.

Greg commented that one can only be as good as ones team. Our success is because of working for a boss who made my job easy. It is a pleasure to work with him. Greg said that President Benjamin is the reason he had the opportunity to come here.

It has been my pleasure working with members of the cabinet. Greg thanked all the Trustees for their kindness and support of him saying no matter where he is or what he is doing ISU will be first in his heart.

President Benjamin expressed condolences to the family of Michael Keane a freshman student from Sullivan who was killed in an automobile accident. His roommate Kyle Ellrod, also a freshman, was a passenger in the car and was injured.

H. REORGANIZATION OF THE COLLEGE OF TECHNOLOGY (Dr. Maynard)

The College of Technology proposes reorganization to three departments from five. This reorganization will promote: (1) greater possibility for synergies by bringing together like programs and faculty, (2) immediate cost reductions that will be reallocated to high priorities within the College, (3) reduction of redundancies, and (4) growth potential by exploring new combinations.

CAMPUS MULTI VENUE VIDEO DISPLAY SYSTEM (Mr. Floyd) I.

At the last Board of Trustees meeting on July 19, 2007 the Board was informed that ISU was in the process of soliciting proposals for a campus multi venue video display system estimated to be at \$749,000. Proposals have been received and the system selected to best meet our needs will cost \$898,500.

Recommendation: Approval to authorize the purchase of the campus video display system at a cost of \$898,500. The source of funds is from auxiliary reserve accounts.

On a motion by Mr. Shagley, seconded by Mr. LaPlante, the recommendation was approved.

REPAIR AND REHABILITATION REQUEST TO STATE AGENCIES (Mr. J. Floyd)

The 2007 Indiana General Assembly appropriated \$1,574,078 for General Repair and Rehabilitation and \$766,912 for Infrastructure Upgrades for Indiana State University for the 2007-08 fiscal year.

Management Discussion and Analysis

Revenues

The June monthly activity shows a \$26,903 unfavorable variance due to Summer I tuition being below budget resulting from withdrawals. The year-to-date performance reflects an \$883,323 above budget variance, the breakdown is as follows: Fall a \$285,555 positive variance, Spring a \$469,456 positive variance, Summer I a \$173,827 positive variance, while Summer II showed a \$45,103 negative variance. The \$883,323 favorable budget variance for tuition is before considering the \$750,000 enrollment stabilization reserve. This reserve was established to cover any potential tuition revenue shortfalls.

Other Fees and Charges has a favorable variance of \$54,837 for June and is above budget for the year by \$311,820. Continuing education, collection fees, incarcerated program, undergraduate admission fees, deferment fees, and change of course fees are up by \$100,567, \$49,000, \$48,170, \$46,956, \$37,025 and \$31,812, while correspondence fees were down by \$17,980.

Sales and Services has a favorable variance of \$9,883 for June and a positive year-to-date variance of \$84,591. This is due to parking violations, transcript fees, and royalty income being above budget by \$37,175, \$25,385 and \$14,124.

Rent and Interest has an unfavorable variance of \$11,172 for June and an accumulative positive variance of \$3,176 as outside rentals was higher than budget.

Miscellaneous Income shows a favorable variance of \$157,316 for June and a year-to-date positive variance of \$171,659. Indirect cost recovery on grants, other miscellaneous income, and salary reimbursement were above budget by \$102,849, \$39,008 and \$27,872.

Expenses

Salaries and Wages

Salaries and Wages has a favorable variance of \$225,507 for the month of June. For the year, \$2,136,390 of favorable salary budget reversion was transferred to Capital and Major Repairs. This was due to a savings in administrative salaries of \$1,356,469, support staff salaries of \$575,224, summer salaries of \$325,708, while overtime exceeded budget by \$300,192. This budget overrun for overtime is partially caused by the large number of vacant positions. The administrative salary budget savings was due to vacant administrative positions that have mostly been filled toward the end of the 2007 fiscal year.

Fringe Benefits has a favorable variance of \$616,851 for the month of June due to the fringe benefit reserve of \$296,683. For the year, \$2,323,986 of benefit reversion was transferred to the Capital and Major Repairs. This favorable variance was due to savings in TIAA-CREF, PERF, FICA, annuities, and staff benefits reserve of \$156,053, \$163,231, \$184,298, \$471,255 and \$296,683. This reversion is also due to the large number of vacant administrative positions and the ability to hold medical premium costs below budget.

Student Wages has a positive variance of \$850,582 for the month of June and a year-todate favorable variance of \$833,352. This represents the carry forward of unspent balance budget in the upcoming 2008 fiscal year. For the year, student wage expenditures increased by \$100,879 from the previous year.

For the year, Utilities had a budget reversion of \$919,833. This is a result of savings in electricity, sewage, natural gas, and fuel oil of \$609,211, \$131,851, \$127,000 and \$50,000. Water was over budget by \$57,249. These savings were retained in the utility reserve to provide resources to manage highly volatile energy costs.

Training, Representation, and Travel

Training, Representation, and Travel has a positive variance of \$255,405 that is carried forward into the new fiscal year. This can be used to supplement the 2007-08 base budget allocation. This year's expenditures are above last year's by \$220,665.

Student Institutional Aid shows a \$351,071 accumulated favorable variance which will carry forward into 2007-08 year. This includes \$200,000 in graduate assistant scholarships to be used for summer 2007 awards and \$151,071 of Terre Haute Med Ed scholarships. Other institutional student aid exceeded budget by \$468,417, which includes the guaranteed student scholarships. This overage was covered out of the Capital and Major Repairs reserve. Expenditures were up \$943,148 over last year's levels resulting from higher tuition rates, increase in the staff dependent waivers, and more students eligible for the guaranteed scholarships. The laptop scholarships for Fall 2006 and Spring 2007 which totaled \$831,657 were not budgeted or included in these amounts, as they were funded out of cash reserves. These scholarships are included in the base budget of the University for 2007-08.

The funding for the Central Chiller was transferred in June leaving a favorable variance of \$40,777. This amount was transferred to the Capital and Major Reserve Repairs at the end of June.

Supplies and Expenses shows a year-to-date variance of \$4,059,039. This represents the carry forward budget unspent in fiscal year 2007 which will supplement 2008 expenditures. These expenditures are above 2006 fiscal year by \$1,348,426.

Repairs and Maintenance shows a \$394,438 positive accumulated variance which will carry forward into the new year. Expenditures are above last year's level by \$36,443.

Capital Equipment

Capital Equipment shows has a favorable year-to-date variance of \$1,353,501 that will be carried forward into 2008 fiscal year. Expenditures are slightly below last year by \$4,357.

Transfer Capital and Major Repairs

This shows the net amount of salary, benefit, and miscellaneous reversions after covering shortfalls in general administrative costs of \$352,716, remitted fees of \$468,417, and increased sick and vacation accrual of \$73,540.

Additional Items

In fiscal year 2001-02, one-twelfth or approximately \$6.5 million of the state operating appropriation was withheld due to state budget constraints. In fiscal year 2007 the State released approximately \$2.4 million to be redirected for repair and rehabilitation projects. Due to the nature of the restriction of the state repayment, the University must replace those funds that were previously expended for university operations and recorded as a receivable in 2001-02.

Management Discussion and Analysis

Revenues

Student Fees shows an unfavorable variance of \$129,936 for July 2007. This is a result of Summer II tuition being below budget.

Other Fees and Charges shows a favorable variance of \$9,064 for July. Deferment fees Other Fees and Charges and change of course fees are below budget by \$5,152 and \$10,015, while collection fees and continuing education are above budget by \$7,083 and \$23,764.

Sales and Services has a negative variance of \$5,272 for July. This is the result of parking Sales and Services violations below budget by \$12,898, while Facilities Management work orders are up by \$8,821.

Rent and Interest has an unfavorable variance of \$4,286 as the fleet rental is below budget for the month.

Miscellaneous Income shows a negative variance of \$4,938 for July as other miscellaneous income and indirect costs are below budget for the month.

Expenses

Salaries and Wages shows a favorable variance of \$76,654 as a result of administrative salary savings of \$125,317, while overtime and graduate assistants are over budget by \$9,155 and \$40,253.

Fringe Benefits shows a positive variance of \$101,092 as a result in savings in TIAA of Fringe Benefits \$58,352.

Student Wages has a positive variance of \$40,842 for July. Student wages are below last year's level by \$39,808.

Utilities shows a positive variance of \$147,605 for July as a result of savings in electricity, natural gas, and sewage of \$87,220, \$17,435, and \$10,086.

Training, Representation, and Travel has a favorable variance of \$34,174 as expenses are Training, Representation, and Travel \$5,594 above last year's level.

Student Aid

Student Institutional Aid has an unfavorable variance of \$426,771 for the month. A portion of this variance relates to ISU Foundation reimbursable scholarships that are reimbursed in June. As Fall 2007 aid has been applied to student accounts, August data will determine the total aid expense compared to last fiscal year for the fall semester. The number of guaranteed scholarships and the rise of the number of students eligible for these scholarships has made it difficult to manage this budget.

Supplies and Expenses

Supplies and Expenses shows an unfavorable variance of \$284,011 for July. A total of \$4.3 million of budget was carried forward into fiscal year 2007-08 to supplement base budgets.

Repairs and Maintenance

Repairs and Maintenance has a favorable variance of \$227,005 for the month. Expenditures are below last year's level by \$244,885.

Capital Equipment

Capital Equipment has a favorable variance of \$264,216 for July. Expenditures are below last year's level by \$568,396. This is due to timing of purchase orders which will catch up during the fall semester.
