Parking

All students, including first-year students, are able to purchase parking permits. Parking Services encourages students to purchase their permits online. Parking permits run from August until July and students have two options available: Student Permit and Remote Permit. The Student Permit will allow your student to park in any lot designated as student or remote parking (Resident Student Permit is available to students living in a residence hall). Remote Permits are lower in cost, but will only allow a student to park in a Remote designated lot.

Study Spaces

Indiana State has some great study spaces on campus! Some of these spaces include:

1. The Health and Human Services Building (Arena). There are several study spots located around this building, including the Wellness Garden for those looking to study outside.
2. The Fine Arts Building is a great space for students looking to study in groups. Students can even hook their laptops up to one of the TV screens in the building to work on assignments!
3. The Science Building has study locations in the basement, as well as on the second floor which overlook the Fountain.
4. If your student is a commuter student, there are two specific locations just for them! One is the Commuter Lounge on the second floor of the Cunningham Memorial Library. This spot even has desktop computers available for use! The second Commuter Lounge is located in the Hulman Memorial Student Union (HMSU), across from the Information Desk. This space has a small kitchen area where students can utilize a small microwave and sink area.
