Program Cancellation/Refund

Back for its second year, the Black Resistance Film Series offers an accompaniment to the events sponsored for Black History Month in Terre Haute. The selections focus on feature-length films dealing with the response to systemic racism by individuals and groups. This year’s choices cover struggles from establishing a personal identity in an unwelcoming dominant society to overthrowing the bonds of slavery to form a new nation based on the slogans of the French Revolution: Liberty, Equality and Fraternity. Extensive notes and discussion ideas will be part of each week’s film showing. Films include:

Rosewood. Starring Ving Rhames, John Voight, Don Cheadle, and Esther Rolle, this 1997 Film portrays the 1923 tragedy in which a prosperous Black community was razed by a Ku Klux Klan mob from neighboring counties. The victims fled to the Everglades, but at least 40 people were killed in the massacre.

Nothing But a Man. A searing indictment of the heavy hand of racism in the 1960s as a Black railroad worker struggles to survive and find love in an oppressive environment. Made in 1964 with soundtrack by Stevie Wonder, the film won praise for its sensitive treatment of real-life problems.

Malcolm X. Spike Lee’s 1992 riveting portrayal of Malcolm Little’s journey from rural Michigan to Harlem and his rise as Malcolm X (played by Denzel Washington) to be a leading figure in the Black Muslim movement and a prime target of the FBI.

Political Polarization: How Did We Get Here & What Can We Do About It

Women’s History Month originated in California in 1978, and the Women’s History Month Film Series focuses on working women who have been left out of the conversation. The films to be shown/discussed honor women workers and emphasize their achievements in fighting for justice and equity and exposing inequality in the workplace.

Invisible Warriors is a documentary film about the Black women who were part of the 600,000 women who left their homes to work in war industries during World War II. This historically faithful movie is a good example of the complexity of the Rosie the Riveter image.

Hidden Figures is a 2016 feature film about the work of three brilliant African-American women who worked behind the scene at NASA to launch the first operations in outer space and who were never recognized or rewarded for their vital contribution to this effort.

Made in Dagenham depicts the 1968 strike at the Ford Motors plant in Dagenham, England, which propelled the female workers on the production line to action against sexual discrimination. In the process, they showed how they could out-strategize the male managers and union officials.

American Violet is the story of a young Black woman working in a small Texas town who, with no history or possession of drugs, gets swept up in a drug raid and thrown in jail. Despite monumental odds, she decides to fight her incarceration on felony charges.

While crime has been decreasing in the United States since 1990, research shows that nearly 100% of the post-2000 decrease was due to the alleviation of social determinate factors of crime rather than traditional crime control. ISU School of Criminology and Security Studies Associate Professor, Dr. Franklin Wilson, will lecture on how Artificial Intelligence will solve many of the remaining social determinate factors of crime.

ISU Professor, Dr. Whitney Nesser, will explore the how and why of each generation through the lens of generational attitudes, lifestyles, technology, and world events.

Join SMWC retired Professor of Theology & Ethics, Dr. Patricia McIntyre, as she surveys the ethically complicated intersections of individual faith, constitutional liberties, and public law. This course explores the legal and political structure that governs implementation of the two religion clauses of the First Amendment, the inherent contradictions within them, and the way both politics and jurisprudence shape their implementation in society. The course identifies what rules apply now, what is changing, and proposes a cooperative structure that seeks maximum liberty and protects the common good.

Explore the aubade in this creative writing session. Students will read and discuss several examples of the aubade from a diverse range of contemporary poets including Traci Brimhall, Aimee Nezhukumatathil, and Ocean Vuong. Building from this craft discussion, we will write our own poem in a guided activity, drawing on the inherent tensions and abundant possibilities the aubade offers. No prior experience with poetry is necessary.

The 1970s in the United States were a success in many ways. U.S. involvement in the Vietnam War ended, relations with China improved to create an important trading partnership, diplomacy reduced the threat of nuclear war with the Soviet Union, the first Earth Day brought environmentalism into the general public's consciousness, and women and tens of millions of minority Americans and persons with disabilities gained greater political rights.

In other ways, the 1970s were a political disaster: Richard Nixon and the Watergate crisis, the weak presidencies of Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter, energy shortages, and the Iran hostage crisis prompted Americans to put Ronald Reagan in the White House in an attempt to provide a new form of leadership to the nation.

In addition to providing a broad overview of the decade, Professor Maxwell will talk about what it is like to teach a college-level class about events that occurred in his lifetime and how today's college students react to those events.

While there have never been more ways to reach an audience, it has also never been more difficult to hold their attention. By focusing on the content of stories and their impact on contemporary audiences, digital storytelling is becoming an arena for exploring new story structures based on digital technology such as virtual reality, object-based audio, and story exploration games. By investigating principles of storytelling across digital media formats, students will learn different techniques for creating projects by analyzing contemporary theories in storytelling. Topics will include story structure, digital narrative, electronic literature, hypertext fiction, interactive storytelling, and transmedia storytelling in journalism.

This rail system connected remote areas to more urban areas and enabled citizens to travel much more quickly and easily.

Jeff Koehler, a scholar of historic modes of travel, has a passion for history and, especially, local history concerning transportation involving canals, the Interurban, and railroads. His studies have lead him to unknown facts and stories surrounding each of these important methods of historic travel.

Jeff has been the Clay County historian for over 20 years and is Vice-President of the Clay County Historical Society and on the Board of Directors of the Canal Society of Indiana. He is a 5th generation farmer and life-long resident of Clay County.

Bob Woodruff is an American television journalist, and since 1996 he has served as a reporter for ABC News. Woodruff was co-anchoring ABC World News Tonight in 2006 alongside ABC News journalist Elizabeth Vargas when he was severely injured by an IED explosion during a reporting trip to Iraq in January of that year. Woodruff slowly recovered from his injuries over an extended period before returning to air, and he is viewed by many journalists as a throwback to the reporters of years ago who reported the news regardless of the danger.
